








FRONT VIEW OF B. C. H. S.

THE HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF '48



Athletics had a new start at good ole B.C.H.S. this year—a new coach, a new stadium, new togs, a remodeled bath house, and a new spirit.






Tigers Whip the Undefeated Bears 6-0


Stuart, right halfback, threw a pass to Langston who was over for a touchdown for the Tigers' first six points.

Tigers Hold Blue Devils To 34 To 19 Win


