## Superintendent Tours Germany

Superintendent of Education, Mr. W. Candler McGowan, heads a system that is recognized by educators as one of the best in the country. Before receiving his appointment as superintendent, a post which he has held for fifteen years, he served Baldwin County schools as a teacher and principal. He holds a Bachelor's degree from the University of Alabama, a Master's degree from Columbia University, and has done further work at that institution.

His administration has been characterized by progress and growth. Expanding student enrollments are reflected by the increase in the number of teachers from 328 to 558. Nine years ago six high schools in the county were accredited. Wellequipped gymnasiums have been added to the senior high schools; a new school established at Spanish Fort; and the Materiel Center, which provides a mobile service for twenty-eight schools in the county, was built in Bay Minette.

Mr. McGowan was chosen as one of thirty school administrators in the United States to participate in the International Field Study of the American Association of School Administrators. This group spent three weeks in the summer of 1968 touring Germany for the purpose of studying the school systems.

Mr. Emanuel Davidson, Chairman of the Baldwin County Board of Education, has served on the board for more than a decade. During this time much progress has been made. His support of the schools and his services have benefited thousands of boys and girls in the county.

## Mr. Williams Introduces Changes

In 1948 Mr . Williams came to our school as a coach and high school teacher. Two years later, he was appointed assistant principal and served in that position for sixteen years before assuming the principalship in 1966.

During his two years at the helm, the school has experienced much growth and advancement. Three new classrooms have been added, a new public address system installed, halls and old classrooms retiled and painted, lockers relocated, improvements made on the athletic fields, and a three-year beautification program of the school grounds begun. A drivers' education course, Agriculture III, Home Economics III, and reading courses have been added to the curriculum.

The many questions facing the students are wisely thought through before they are given an answer by Mr. Yokel. Visits to the classrooms for important talks with the students, group and individual testing, and the keeping of the many records make up the busy schedule of our counselor. His office is also the headquarters for club activities. He supervises the membership of eighty clubs which meet at a regularly scheduled time.

Mrs. Bryan Mattnews, Mrs. James Harris, and Miss Harriet D'Olive make up the office staff. A student wishing to see the principal, a parent calling to reach a child, a summons from the principal's office for secretarial help, and record keeping are all duties assumed by this office.
A new position added to the system this year is that of teachers' aid. Miss Harriet D'Olive fills this position. Her duties consist of assisting the teachers in the typing and "running off" of work for the classroom.

## English Is Basic to Learning

Fundamental to all learning are the skills taught in the English classes - listening, speaking, reading, writing, critical thinking, and evaluation. Recognizing the fact that it is vital to the welfare of all peoples of the world to be able to communicate successfully, the eleven Baldwin County High School English teachers continually strive to promote the mastery of the English language. Twelve hundred students are instructed daily in the fifty heterogeneously arranged classes in the seventh through the twelfth grades.

The teachers participated in the county-wide workshop, held in connection with a study of the English programs of six Southeastern states, during the summer of 1967. Follow-up work has continued in the inservice meetings throughout the year. The addition of the developmental reading program has greatly strengthened that area. Many students take part in the English-related clubs, activities, and organizations.

## World Citizenship Stressed

To teach respect for law, institutions, and develop pride in the Nation's past history are the aims of the social sciences. These ideas are included in the study of American citizenship. American citizenship is national in scope, and it includes participation in a complex but unified world. Citizens' responsibilities today are complex, as the United States is no longer isolated by two oceans; and a closely knit world of national states is necessary.

Ten teachers teach 1,056 students in forty-two classes during seven periods a day. These students take one or more of the following courses: American history, world history, Alabama history, civics, American government, or communism.

## Math Department Changes Approach

The Mathematics Department is in its fourth year of transition from the old to the new "modern" concept of teaching mathematics. Eventually all grades (one through twelve) will be involved in this modern approach, which the administration and faculty strongly believe will enhance the students' abilities to think and to reason things out for themselves.
