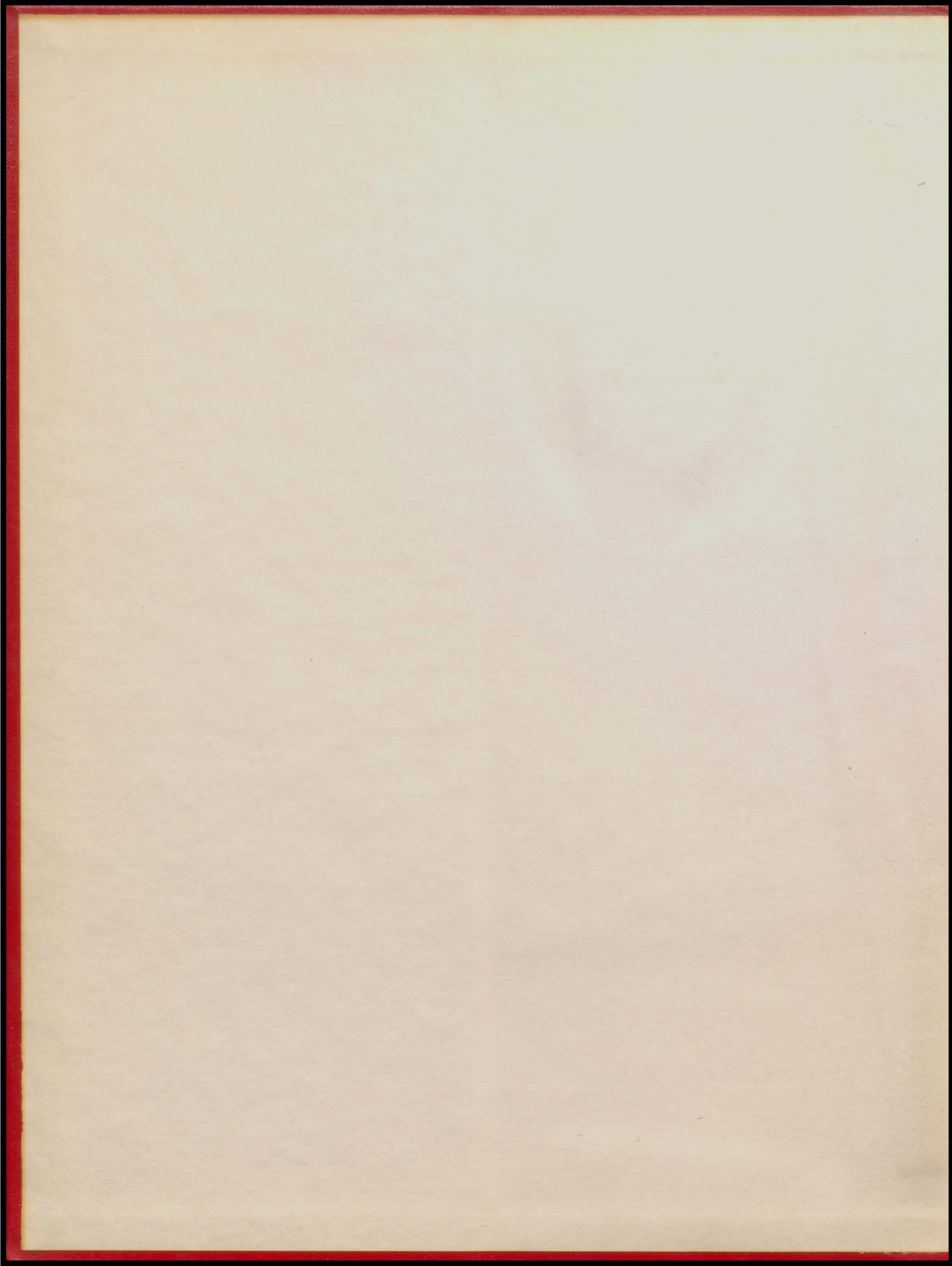
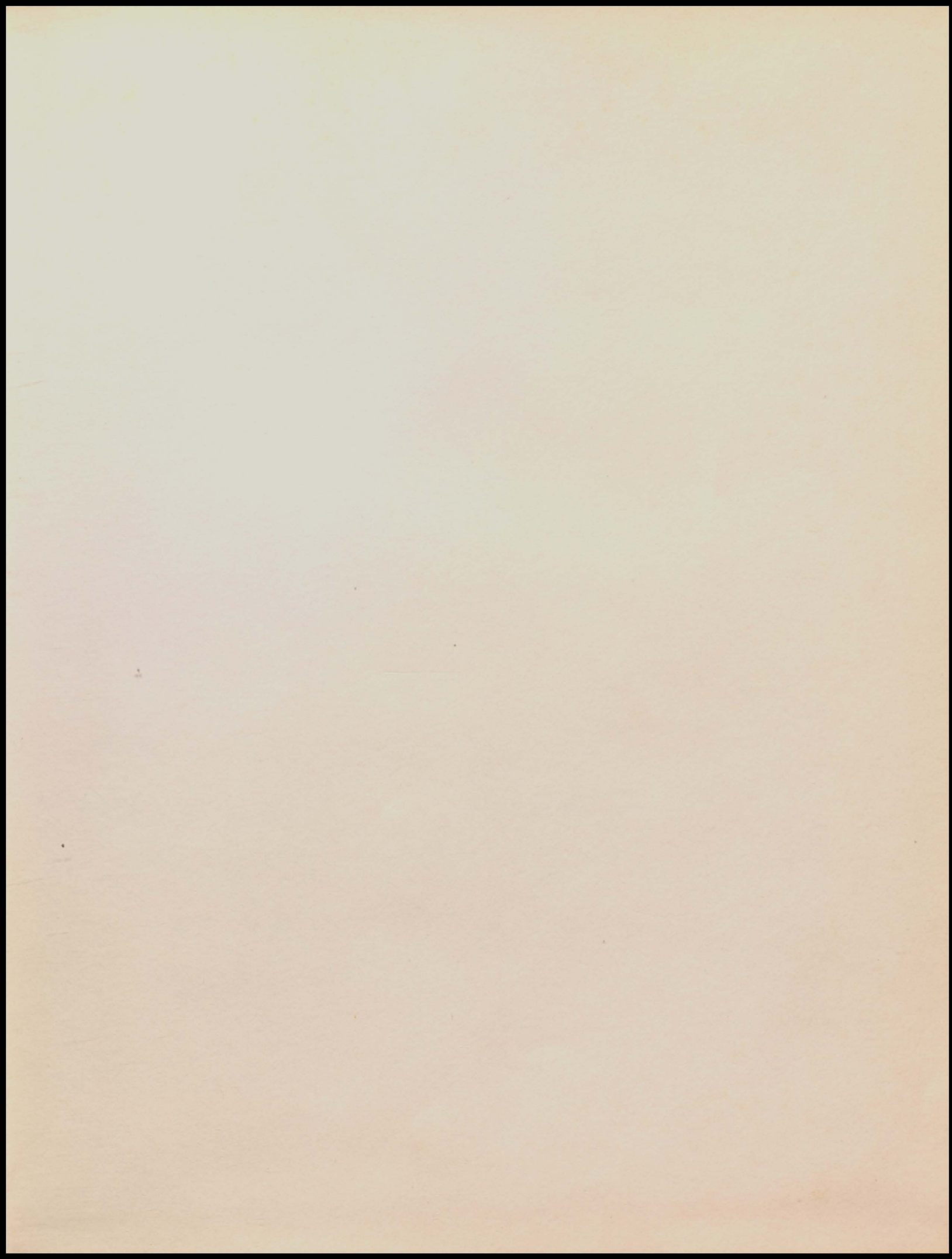

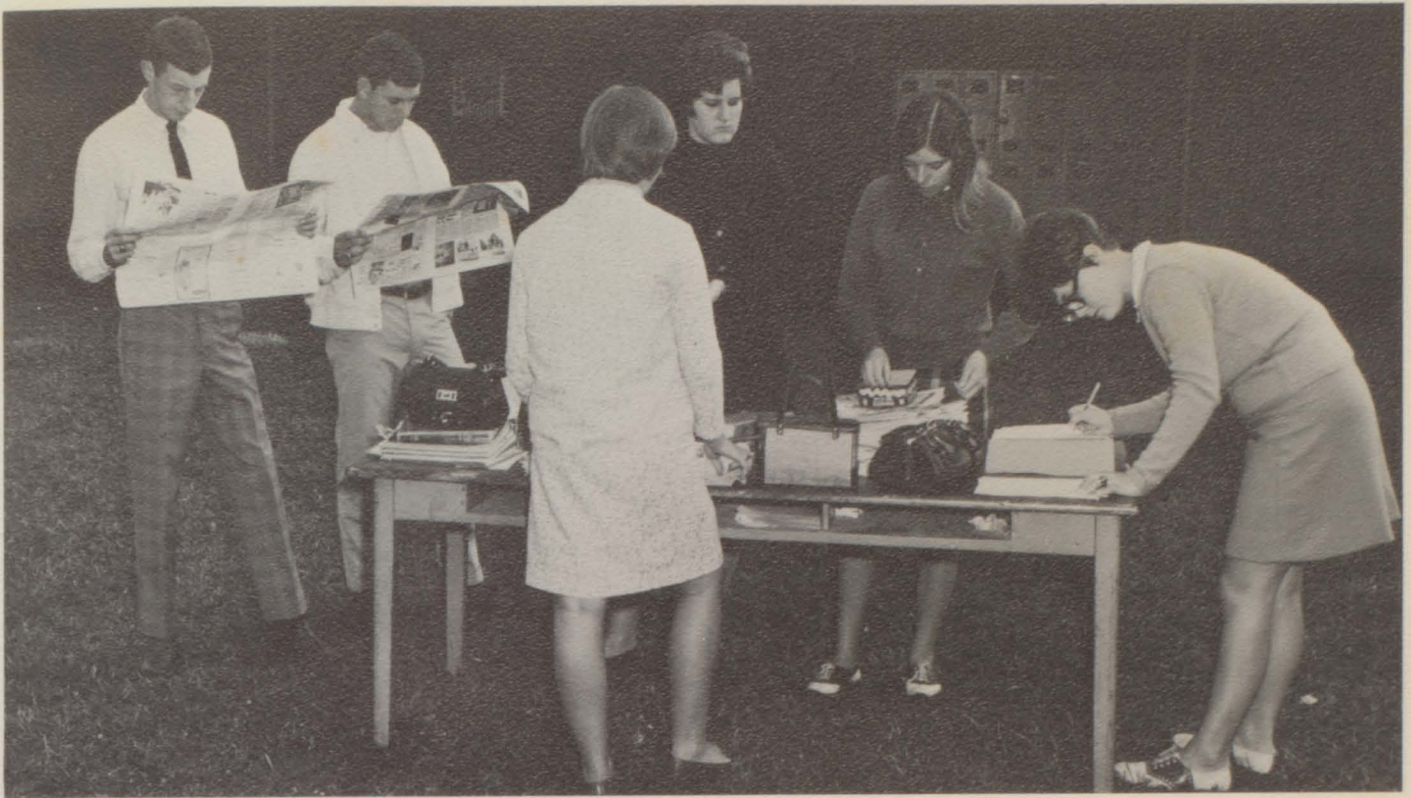

Extracurricular and club activities are an integral part of the total school program. Involvement in these activities contribute to growth and development for life in a democratic society.

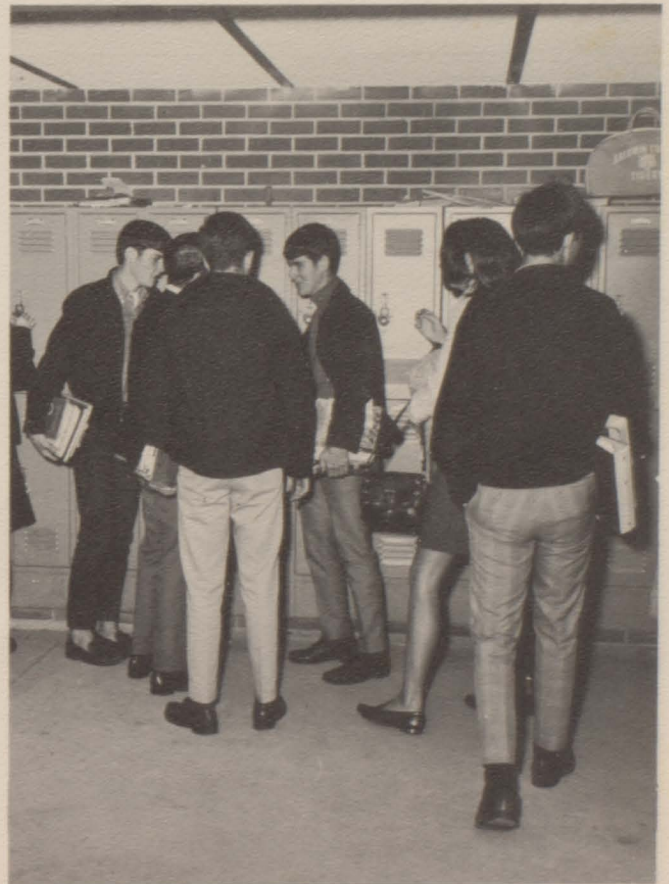

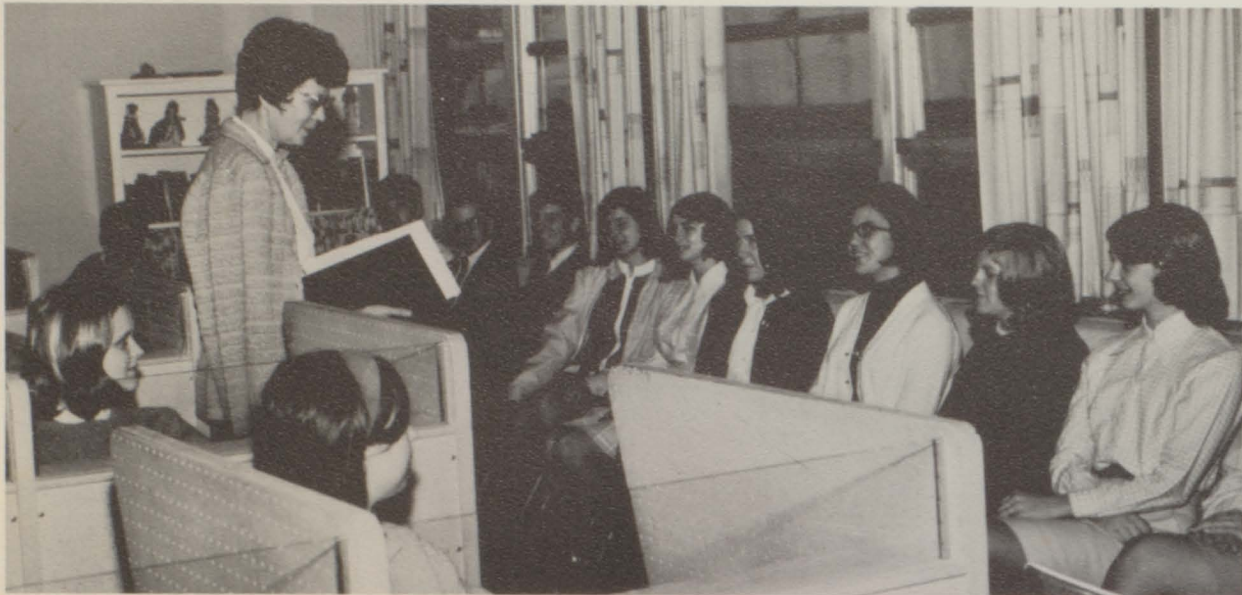

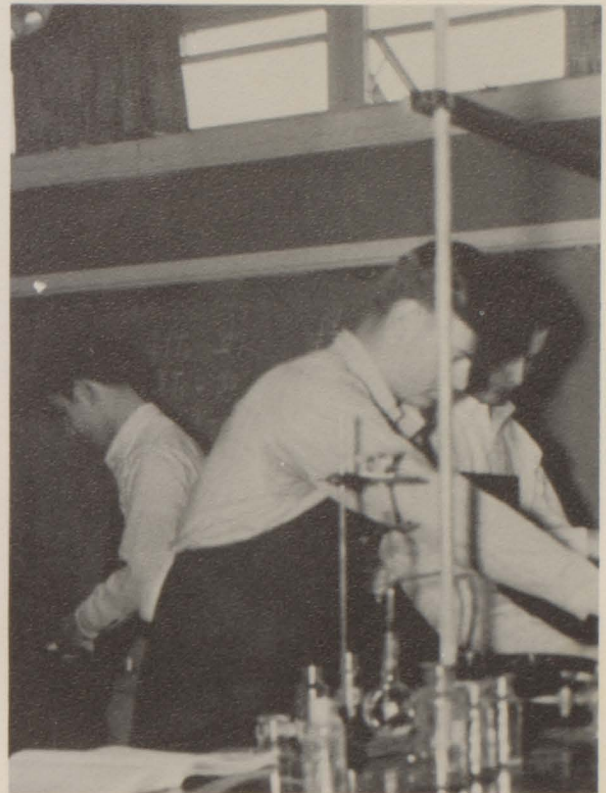

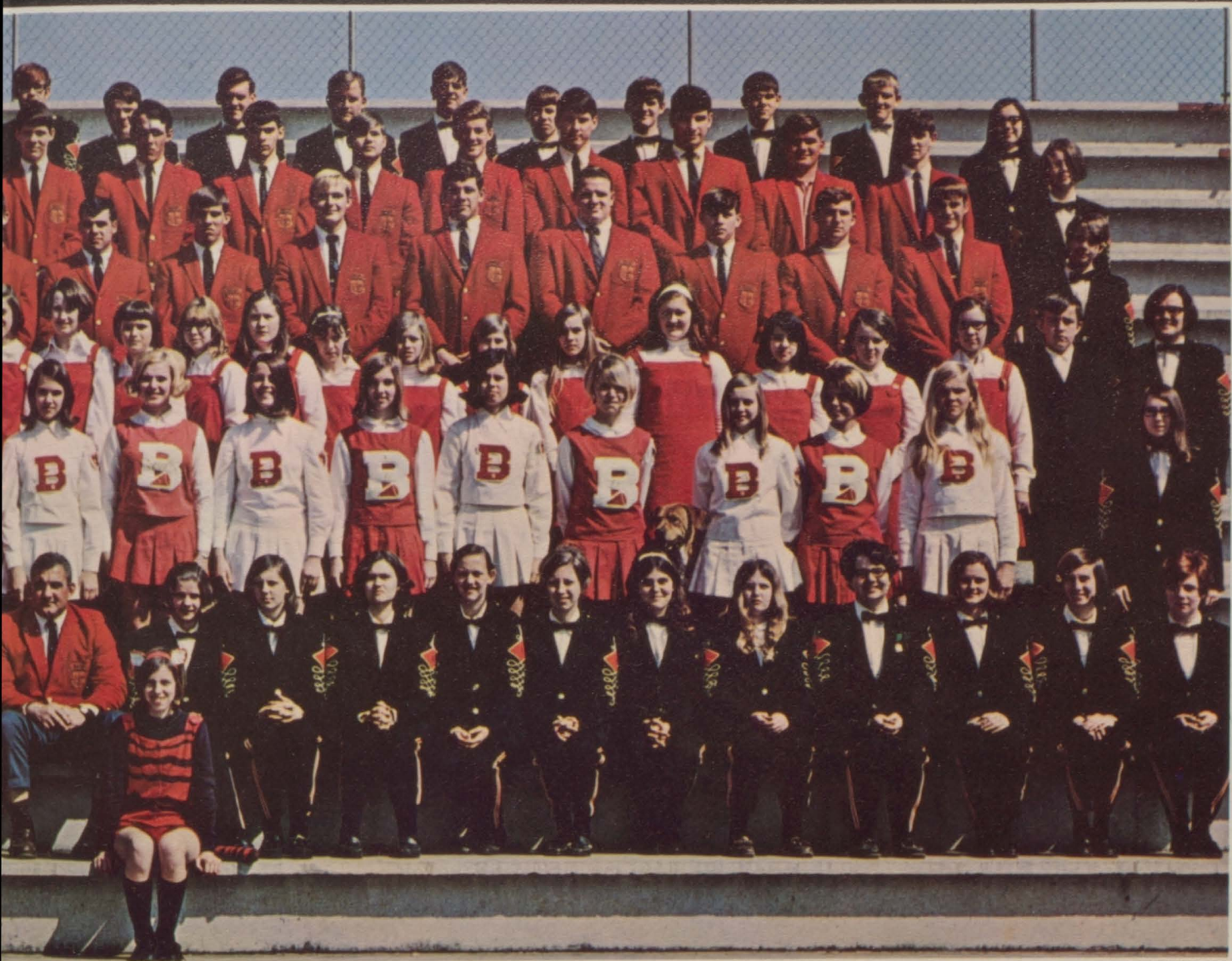

Tornado Damages School

On November 3, 1968, at 7:00 p.m., a tornado struck the Baldwin County High School campus. The damage was estimated at two million dollars.

A number of classrooms, the cafeteria, the gymnasium, and the football stadium were extensively damaged. Carpenters, bricklayers, electricians, painters, and public address system repairmen were a familiar sight for the remainder of the year.

Teachers, students, and the community joined efforts and, after one week, school was resumed. All classes were held on campus with the exception of the band and glee clubs. These groups were transported to the First Baptist Church. In February all classes were returned to the campus.

One of the greatest changes wrought by the tornado was the loss of the many beautiful oak trees which shaded our campus. The bare look of the school grounds will remind students for many years of this fateful night.

Citizens Aid School

The rebuilding of Simmons' Field, B.C.H.S.' football stadium, began almost immediately after the tornado did an estimated \$50,000 damage. Because the stadium was uninsured, many of the school and civic clubs of the community had numerous fund raising projects, with all proceeds going to the Stadium Fund. A Steering Committee was formed to coordinate the work of these clubs. The committee had as president, Taylor Wilkins, Jr.; vice-president, John McMillan; and secretary, Lottie Reid. 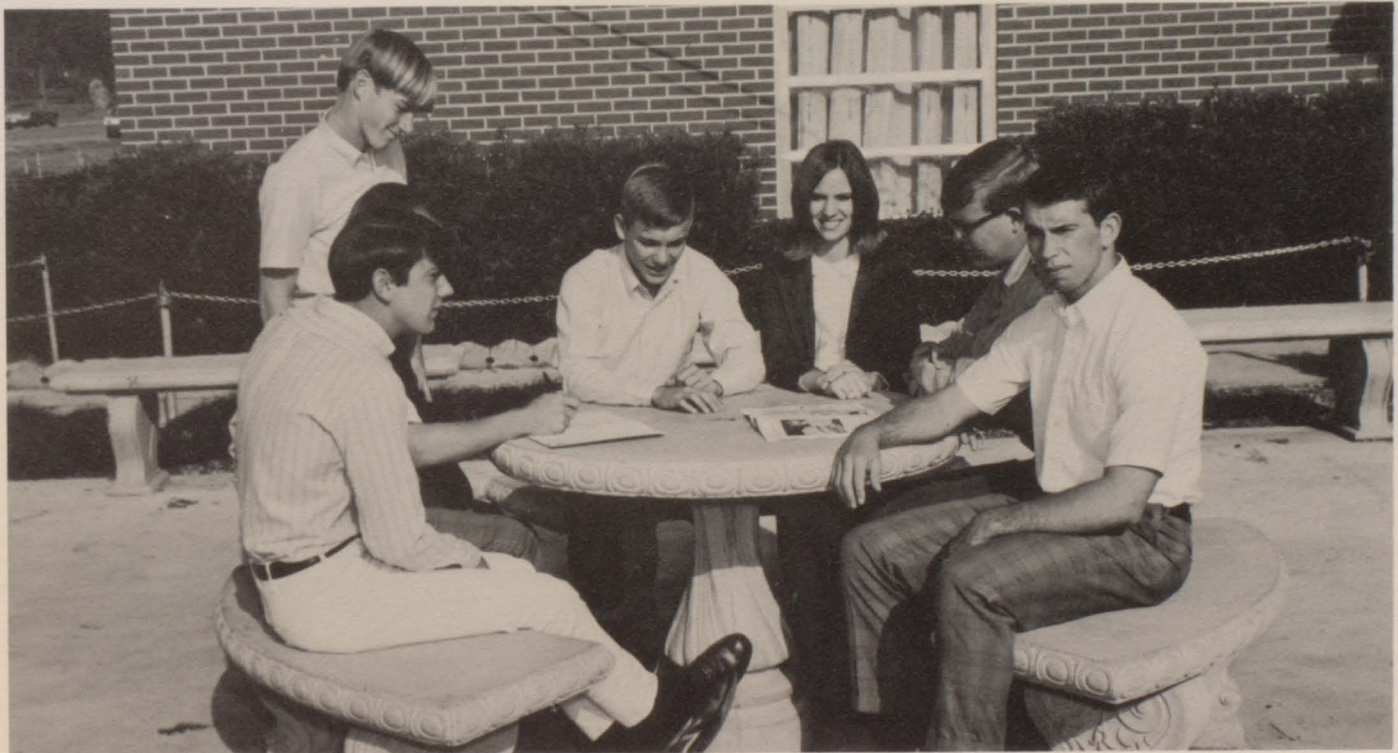

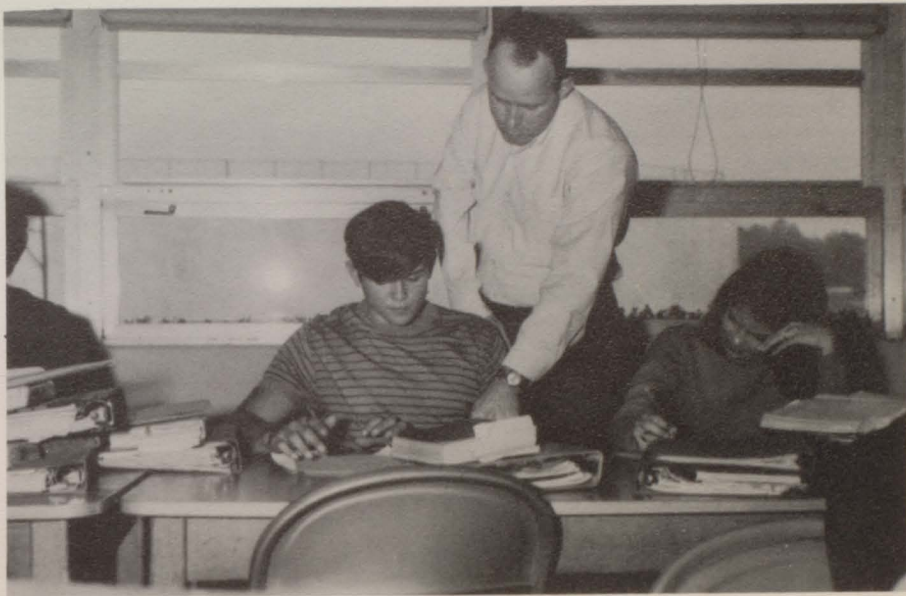

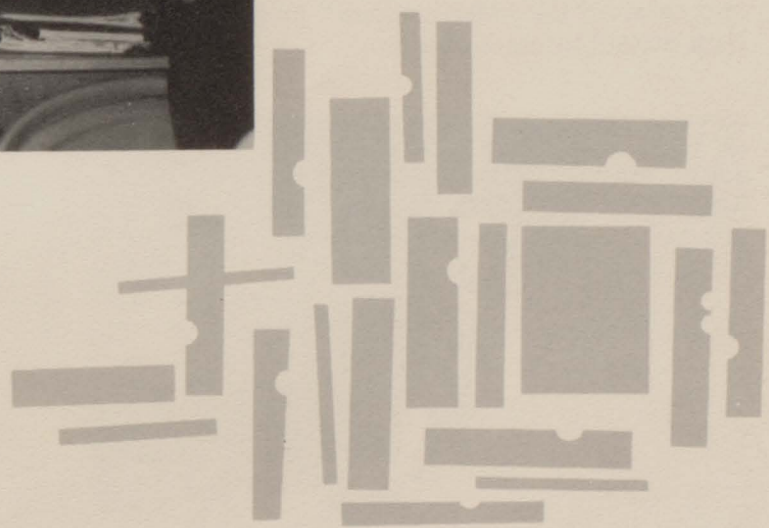

Mr. McGowan, Citizen of the Year

Mr. W. Candler McGowan has been Superintendent of Education in Baldwin County for sixteen years. Before assuming this position he had been a teacher and principal for twenty-five years.

He attended the University of Alabama and Columbia University and holds a Master's Degree.

As Superintendent he has evidenced many changes and improvements in our system. The increase in student population during his tenure of office is reflected in the increase in the number of teachers from 328 to 570. All six county high schools have been accredited by the Southern Education Association of Secondary High Schools and Colleges and have remained on the accredited list for ten years. New gymnasiums for all six high schools, a central Materiel Center with mobile service to all schools in the county, a new school in the Spanish Fort area, new classrooms to accommodate the increased enrollments, and a new county-wide reading program show the progress achieved under his leadership. The most recent physical improvement was the building of new bus maintenance shops throughout the county to service the school busses which transport about fifty percent of our students to school each day.

This year Mr. McGowan was the recipient of the "Citizen of the Year" award given annually by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. For his devotion to duty and unselfish service in the community, he also received the "Merit Award" presented by the High School Interact Club.

The Baldwin County Board of Education is elected by the voters of Baldwin County and consists of five members: Dr. H.C. Jordon of Fairhope, Max Griffin of Foley, Paul Cleverdon of Summer-

dale, John M. McMillan of Stockton, and Emanuel Davidson of Bay Minette. The Board is charged with the responsibility of maintenance and continued progress of our school system.



The Materiel Center located in Bay Minette has in one short year become the center of learning for the teachers. Short workshops during the school year and summer workshops in all areas of teaching have made the center the place teachers look to for enrichment materials.

Mobile bus service has made the center within an hour's reach of all schools within the county.

Mr. Wallace R. Williams has served as Principal of Baldwin County High School for three years. He came here as an assistant coach and teacher in 1948. Two years later he was made assistant principal, a position he held until 1966, when he became principal.

Mr. Williams attended Livingston State University and George Peabody University where he received his B.A. and Master's degrees. He has also studied at Mississippi College and Columbia University.

Mr. Williams has seen much change come to the school under his guidance. Three new classrooms and a new public address system have been added; halls and classrooms have been retiled and painted; lockers were relocated to give more room in the halls; much improvement has been made in the football stadium; a three-year beautification program of the grounds is in the second year; new courses have been added in the field of driver's education, vocational agriculture, home economics, and reading. Work is underway on closed-circuit television which will enable each class to view tapes in class as well as special school programs.

Mr. Messick is assistant principal at B.C.H.S.

Assistant Principal, Mr. O'Neal Messick, came to Baldwin County High School in 1959 as a math teacher and assistant coach. In 1966 he became assistant principal in charge of the Bay Minette Grammar School.

Mr. Messick received his B.S. and M.A. Degrees from Troy State University. He is an active member of the Kiwanis Club in which he serves as first vice-president. Other offices include secretary of the Quarterback Club and vice-president elect of the Baldwin County Teachers' Association.

Many physical changes have been made since Mr. Messick became assistant principal. A three year beautification program of the grounds, painting of all the classrooms, and the installation of closed-circuit television have been the major changes.

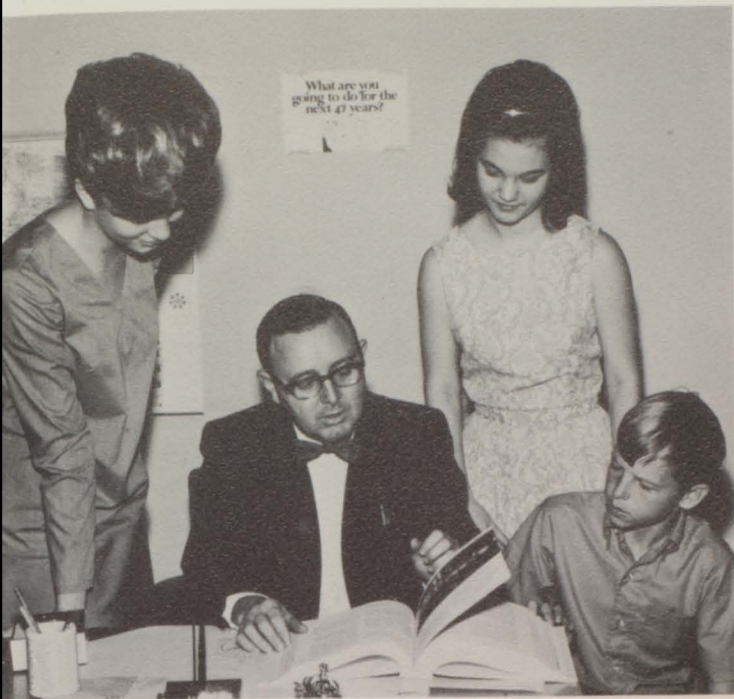


Mr. Yokel Gives Tests

Choosing the college best suited to their needs is a very important decision for students. Mr. William Yokel, guidance counselor, spends much of his time during the year on this matter. Throughout the year many tests are given for college preparation such as the Koder Preference Record given to 8th grade students; Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test, which is a practice college entrance exam; National Merit Scholarship Exam, given for scholarship competition; the SAT and ACT Tests for college entrance. Various other tests are given for certain branches of the service. Another major work performed by Mr. Yokel is helping new students adjust to school life at Baldwin County High School and aiding all the students in solving their problems.

Due to the request of many teachers and students the club time this year was limited to one hour with students choosing only one club. Much confusion has been eliminated, and there are now 50 clubs as compared to 80 clubs of last year.

Mr. Yokel attended the University of Evansville and Memphis State College, from which he received his B.A. and M.A. degrees respectively.

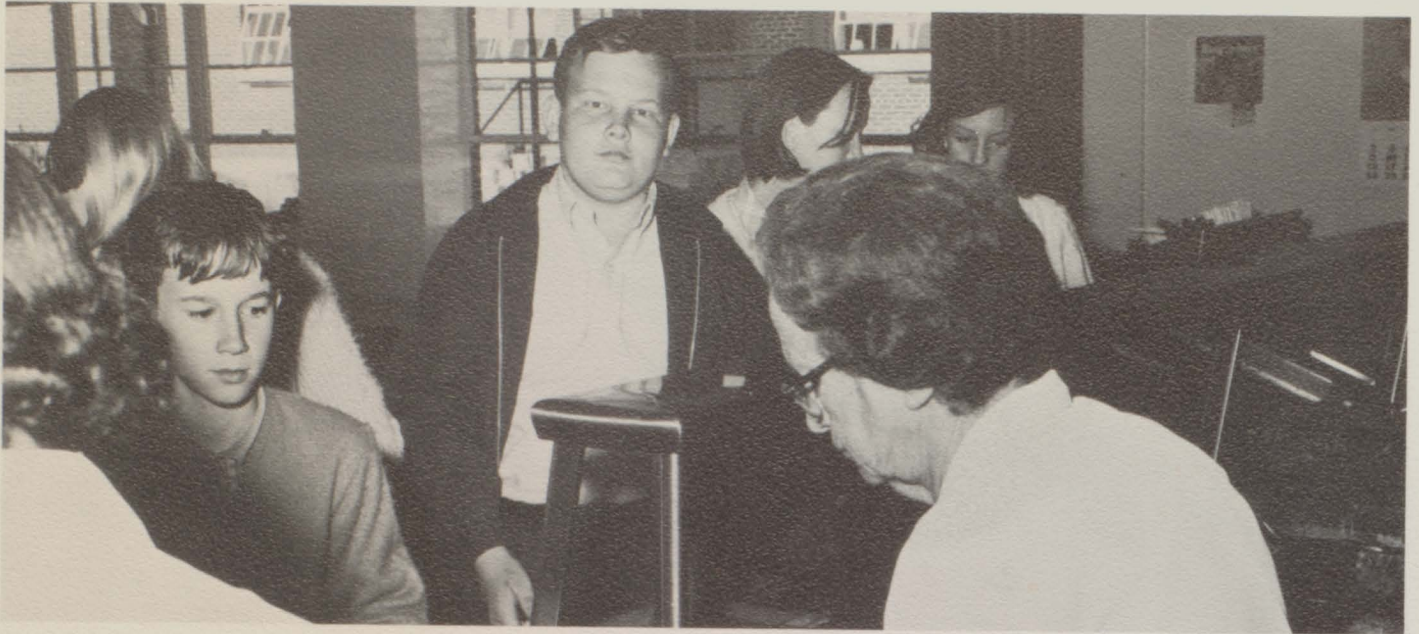

Mrs. Marie McKay, head dietician, and fifteen lunchroom workers prepare approximately 1220 lunches each school day. Students and teachers from the first through the twelfth grades in a series of staggered lunch hours patronize the well-equipped, attractive cafeteria.

Well-balanced and nourishing noonday lunches may be purchased for the minimum cost of thirty-five cents per student. Those who bring their lunches may eat in the cafeteria and buy milk to drink.

English Classes Filmed for Study

Recognizing that communication at home and abroad is of primary importance to the citizens of the United States, much emphasis was placed on expression of thought and on understanding the written and spoken word. (English is the native tongue of more people in the Western World than any other language, and it serves as the second language for many nations around the globe.)

Thirteen teachers tried innovative methods in the teaching of English grammar, literature, and reading to 1350 students daily. Rooms were equipped with overhead projectors, and the teachers had access to innumerable aids from the school library and the Materiel Center. All of the teachers attended the county in-service meetings directed by Mr. Aubrey McVay and Miss Catherine Steedley. English specialists worked with the groups at these meetings and at the summer workshops.

The Science department consists of seven teachers who teach a total of thirty classes of junior high science, biology, senior science, chemistry, and physics.

In striving to bring the students to the realization of the part that they play in the chemical, physical, and biological world of science, the Department

must keep up with new discoveries in the world of science and relay them to the students.

New equipment purchased this year consists of the replacement of broken or inefficient physics and chemistry laboratory equipment such as Bunsen burners, glass articles, locks, and a new supply of chemicals.

450 students receive courses in basic business education. Bookkeeping, business math, shorthand, and Typing I and II are offered to these students. With the exception of Typing I and II, for which fifteen dollars is charged, there is no fee for these courses. Three teachers make up the staff of this department.

Students are encouraged to take some of these subjects whether they plan a career in the business world or not. Business education is vocational, and the program offers specialization to the students who wish to have occupational competency when they leave high school.

Three Departments Merge into One

A total of 126 students are taught home economics daily. Home Economics I, II, and III, which cover the areas of sewing, food and nutrition, family budgeting, home management, personal grooming, and family relationships, are offered to students in grades 10, 11, and 12. Accomplishments in sewing and cooking are shown in the annual fashion show and the beef cook-off.

The Vocational Agriculture Department at Baldwin County High School has expanded to a four year program offered to grades nine through twelve. General science with emphasis on plants and animals is taught in first-year agriculture while second-year is concerned with welding, carpentry, surveying, and forestry. Farm mechanics, landscaping, farming, food processing, and advanced forestry are taught in the advanced classes of 3rd and 4th year agriculture, with on the job training in wood pulp production in the pine forests owned by International Paper Company. Over 100 students are instructed in six classes each day by Mr. Bryon Nall.

Vocational Industrial Education enables students to graduate from high school with experience in a specific occupation. An opportunity is offered to employers to train their future employees in their chosen profession.

The band played for all football games and pep rallies, marched in the Homecoming Parade, and the Fairhope Christmas Parade. A spring concert was given for the April P.T.A. meeting.

Four hundred students are taught chorus classes daily. The groups are divided into 7th, 8th, and 9th grade choruses, SSA, and SATB. Triple Trio and the men's ensemble are select groups chosen from SSA and SATB. A Christmas concert was given for the P.T.A. and a spring concert was held in April. A \$1,000 profit was made on the candy sale which will be used to buy a tape-recorder and materials needed to build up the department.

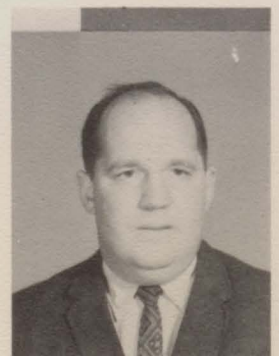

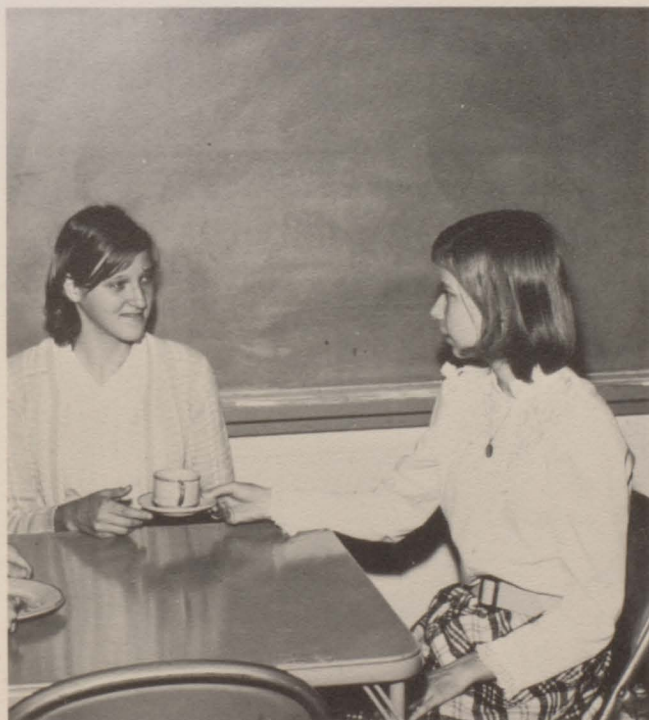

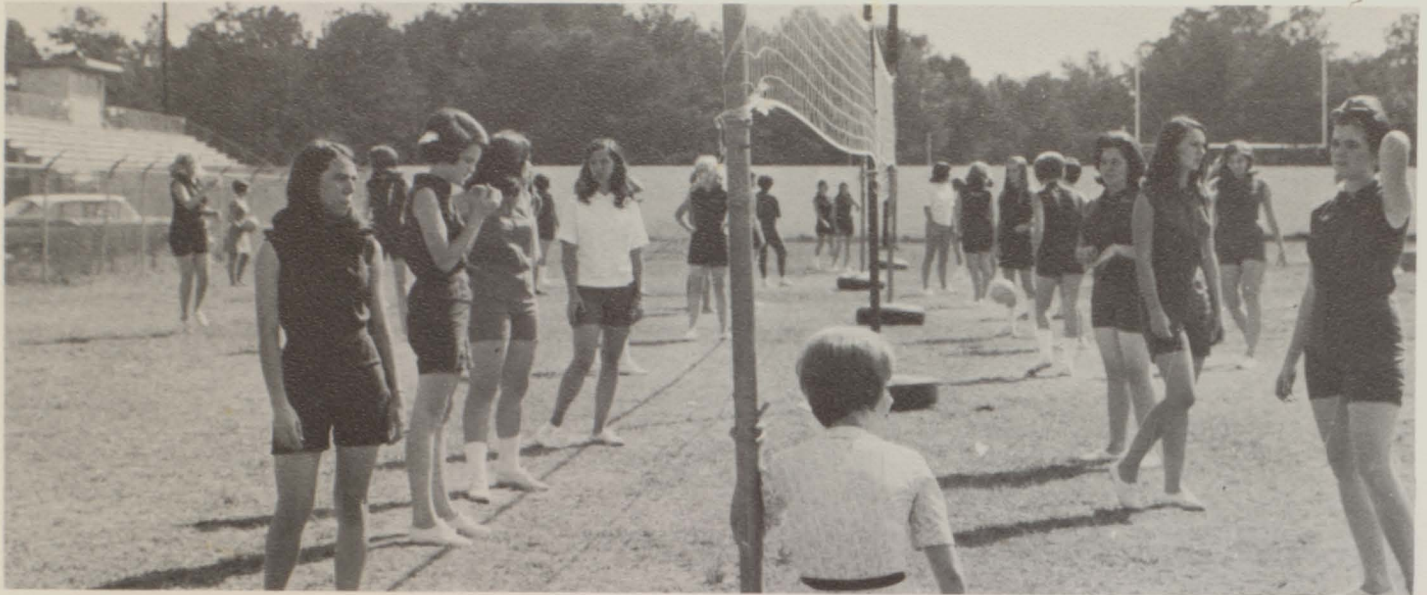

Book Cards Issued to Students

There are over 7,000 volumes in the school library and a 1,000 more on order. The professional library composed of periodicals and books for the faculty is rapidly expanding. Mrs. Shoenight, head librarian, is making an effort to increase the number of books in the areas most widely used.

Students working on term papers may use the vertical file in filmstrips and records for additional information. Art prints are also available for reference. Through the library, teachers may order from the Materiel Center transparencies, posters, films, filmstrips, records, kits, tape recordings, slides, and three-dimensional models.

A new system for checking overdue books has been installed; a student is charged two cents a day for an overdue book, and his book card is suspended until the book is returned.

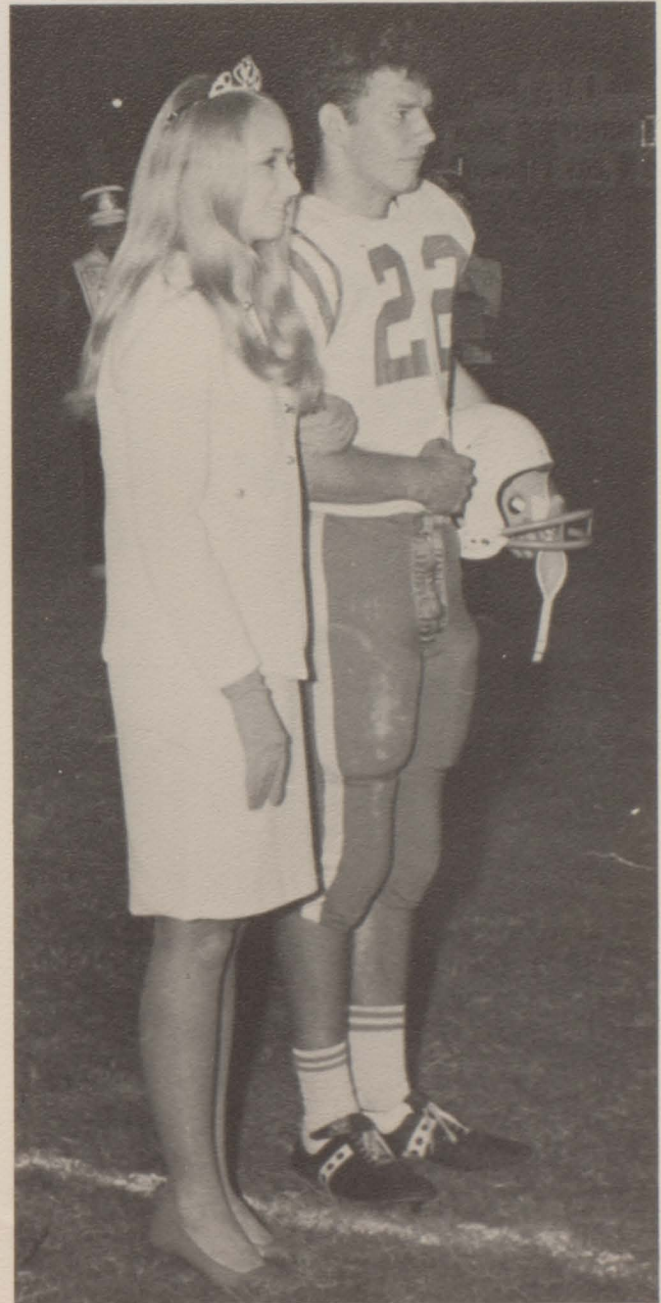

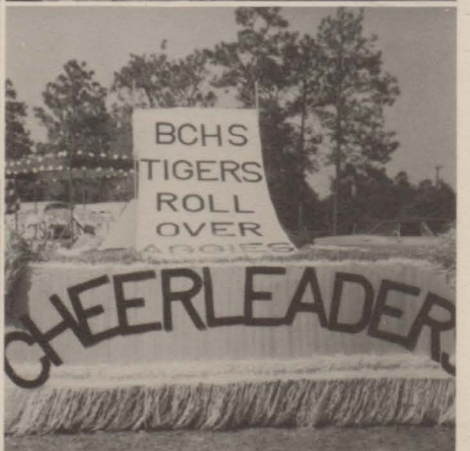

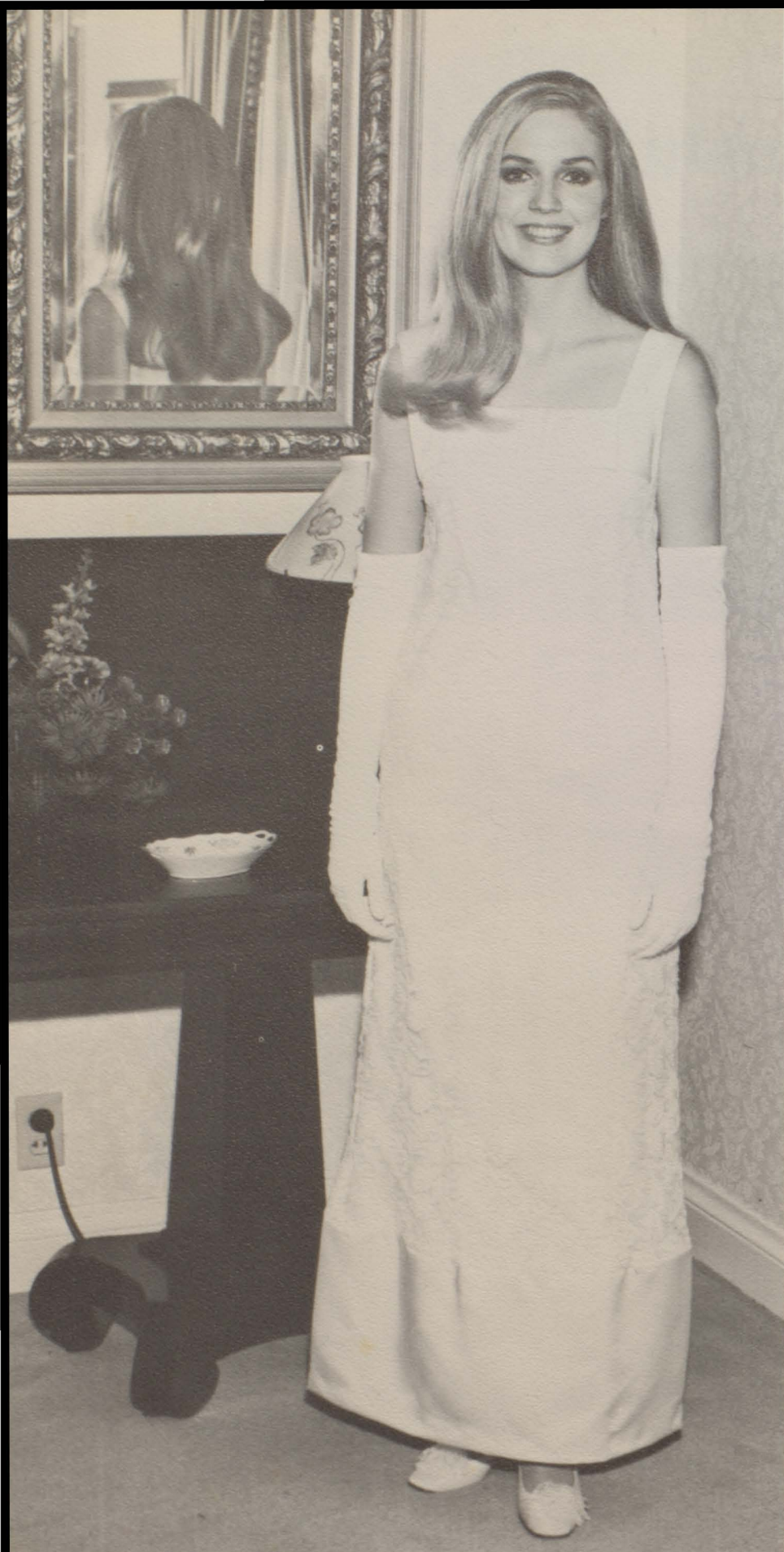
The recipients of these honors must display the following qualities: patriotism, scholarship, integrity, respect for property, respect for superiors, responsibility, and cooperativeness.

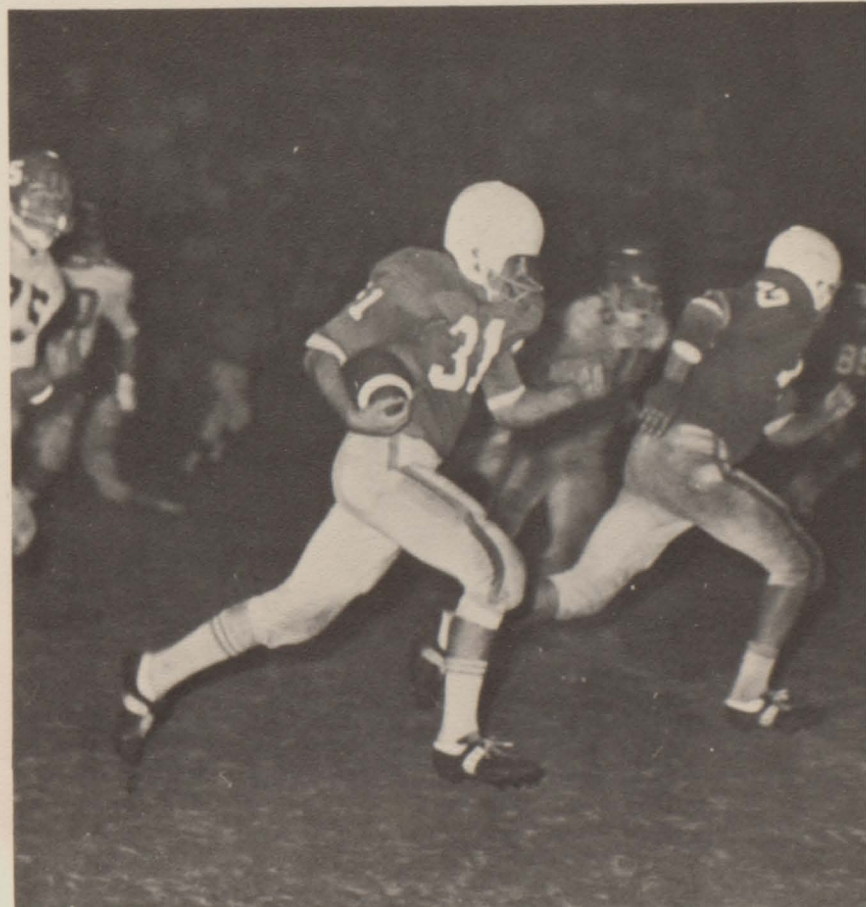

The officers and members of the standard clubs on campus were recognized. Special recognition was given to the faculty for their tremendous support and help in counting ballots.

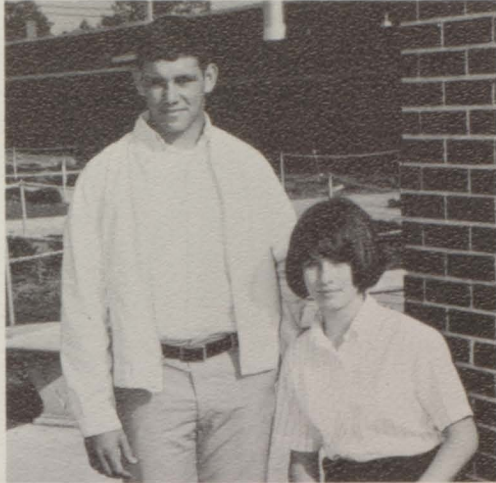

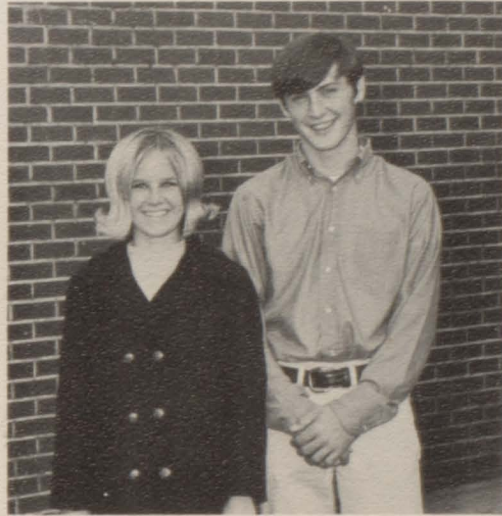

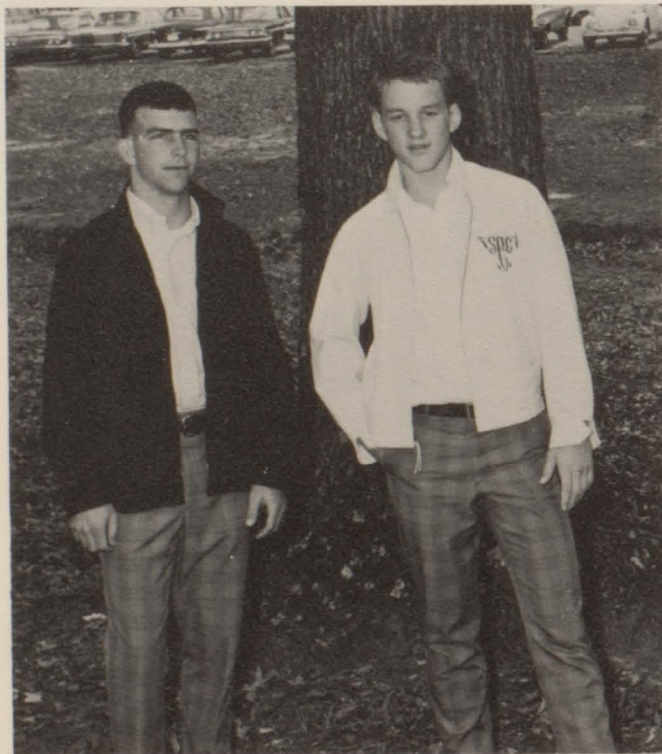


Top Football Players Recognized

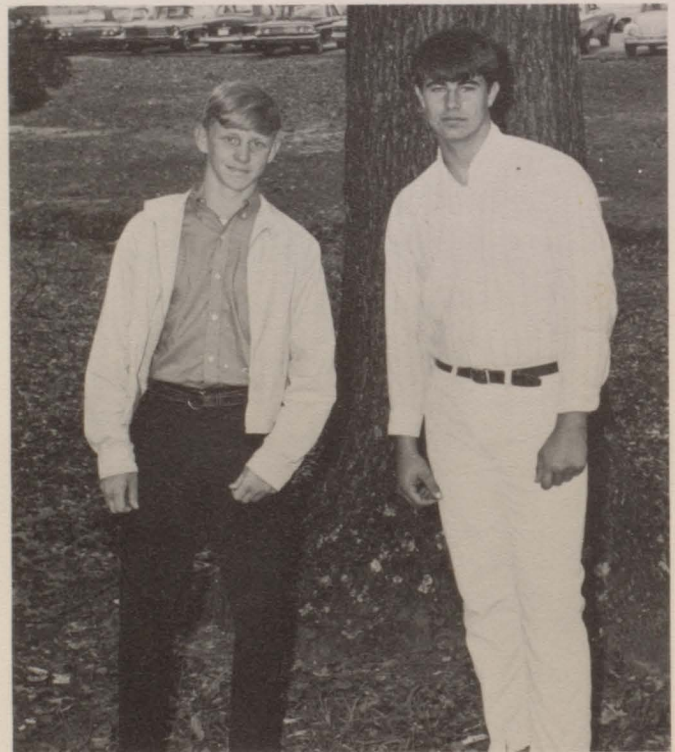
A "first" at Elite Night was the announcement of the outstanding players for the season. These were selected by the coaching staff based on their performance on the turf.

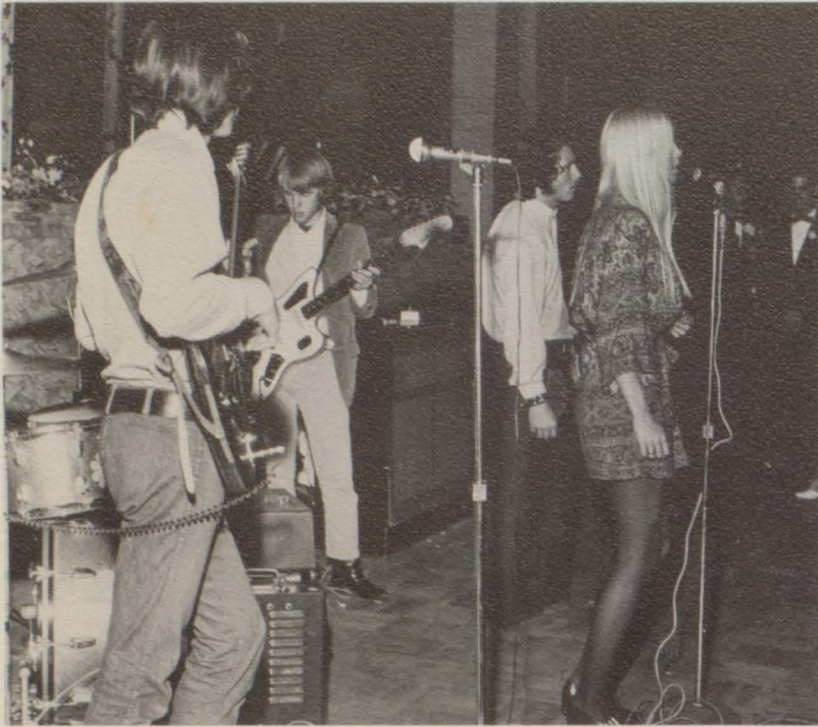

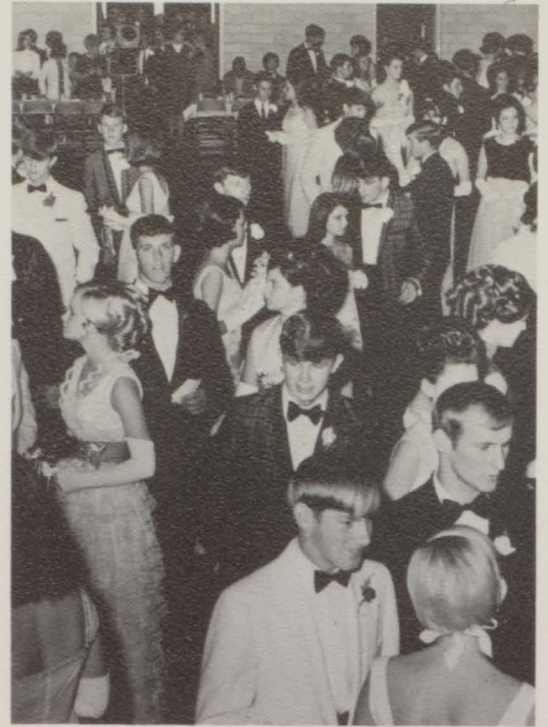

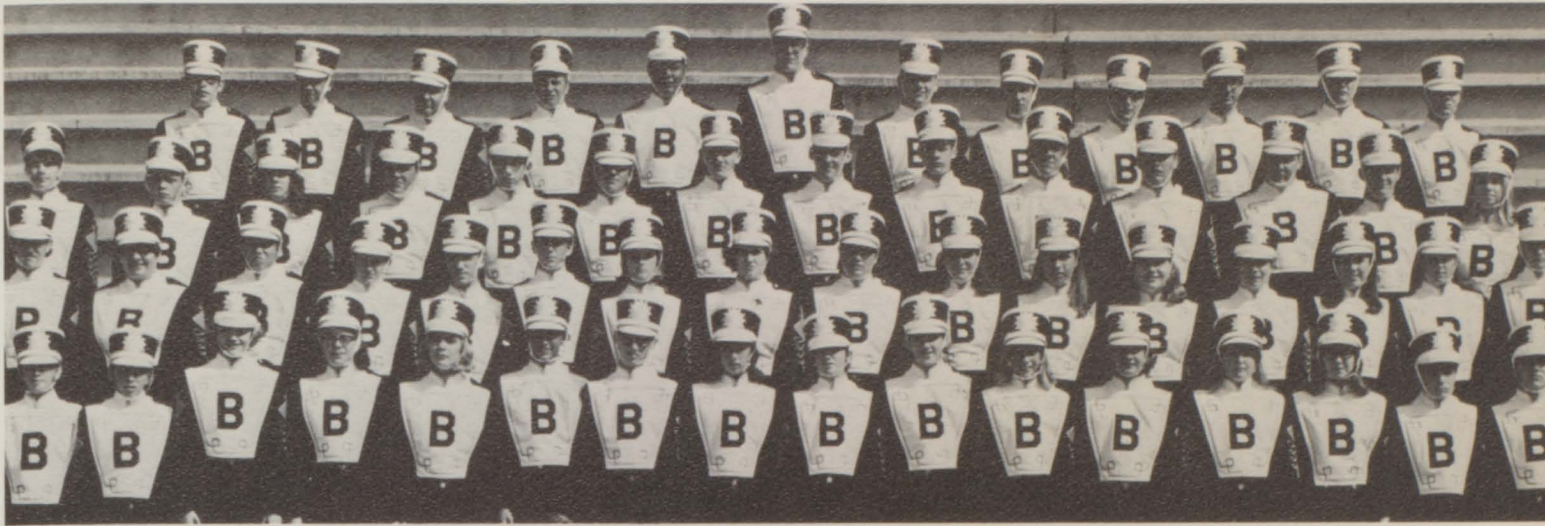

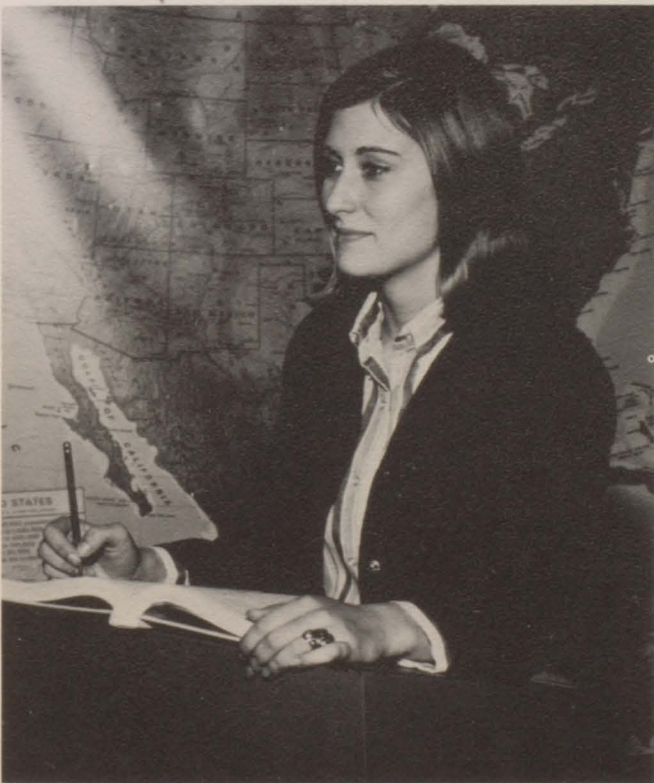

The Faculty sponsors of the Student Council were Miss Brenda Cole and Mr. George Price.

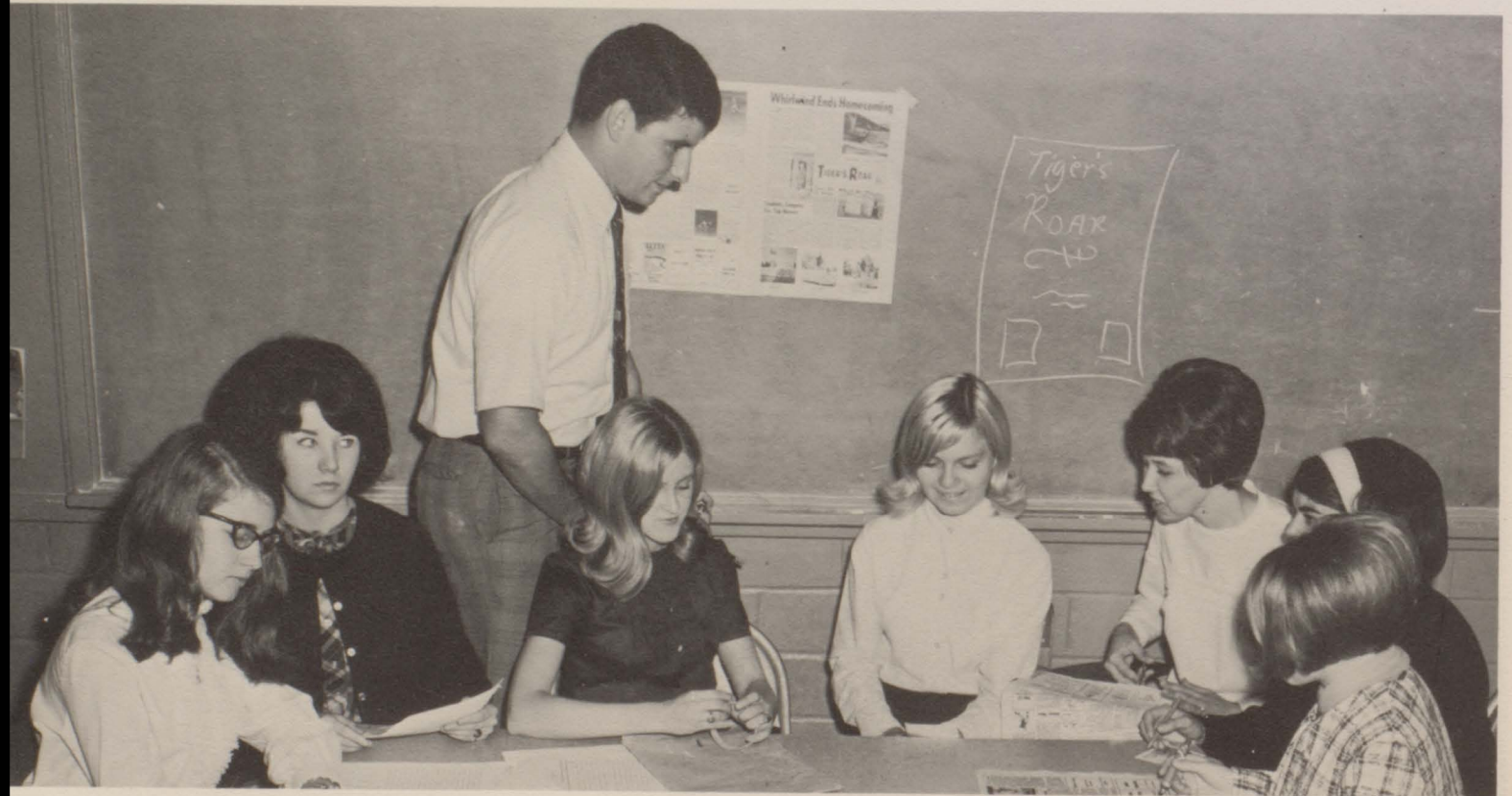
Tiger's Roar

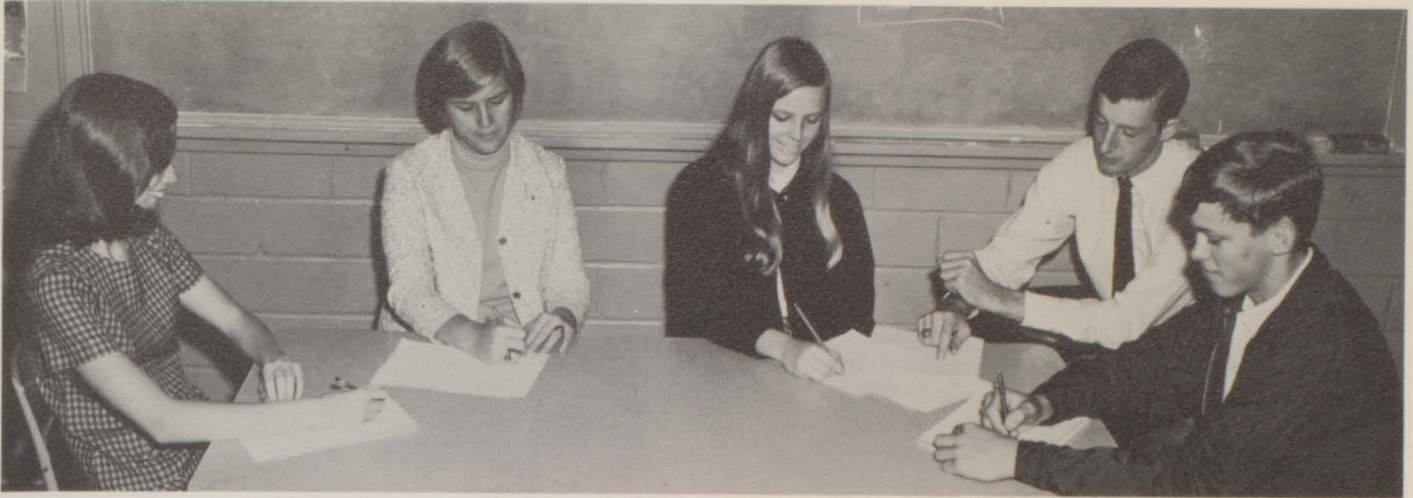

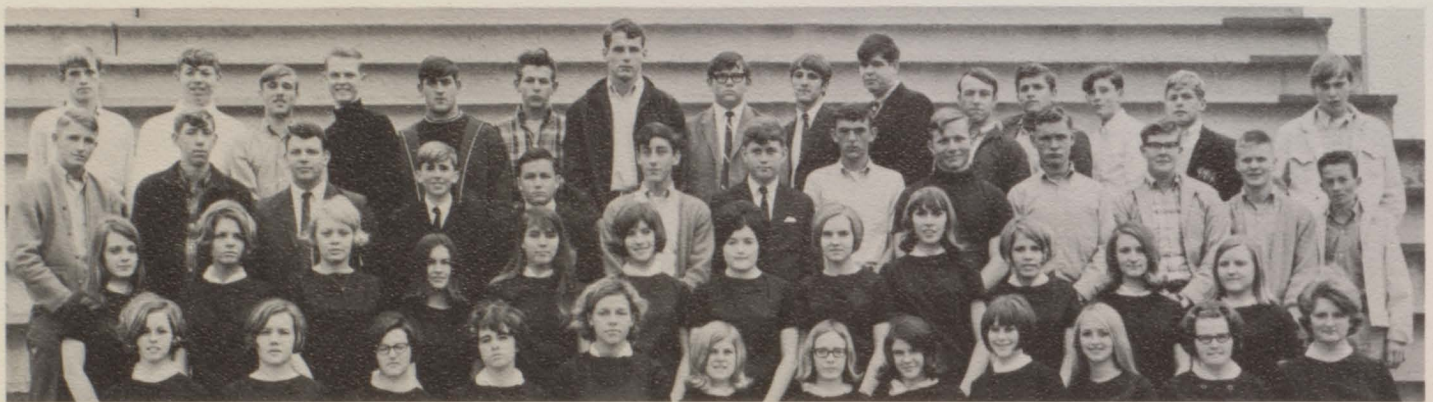

To be eligible for membership in the National Honor Society, a student has to have an "85" over-all average, beginning with the 10th grade. He must have had no less than a "C" in any elective course and no less than an "85" average in English and social studies combined.

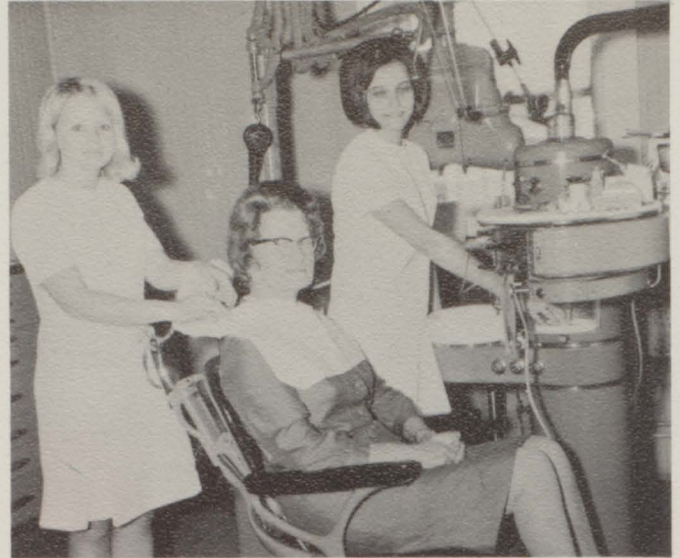

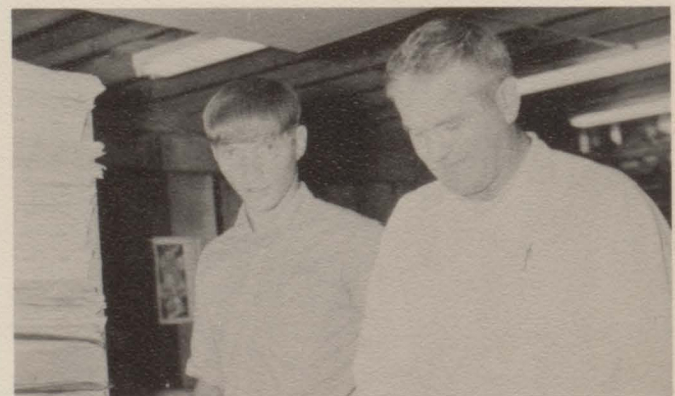

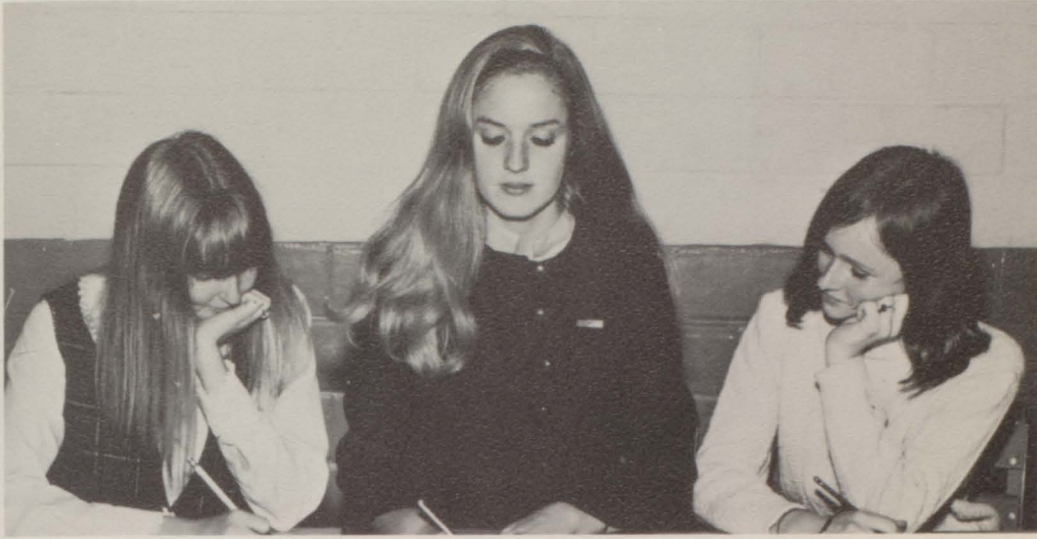

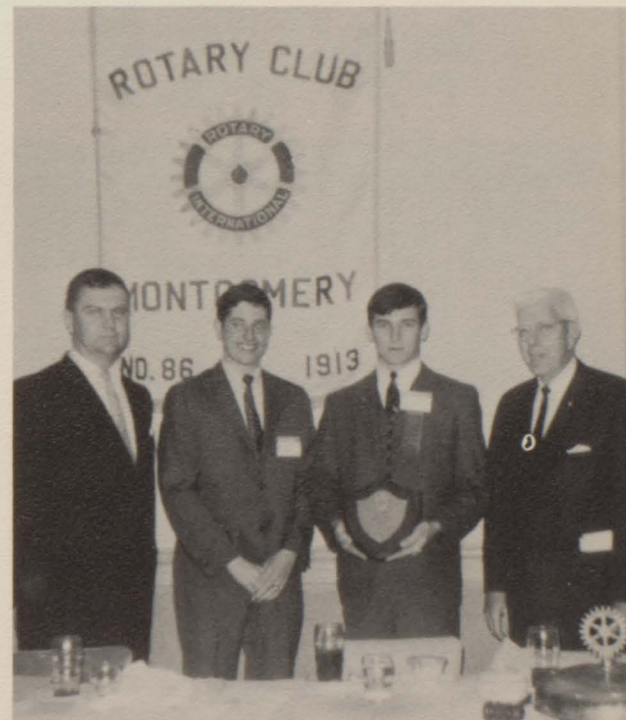

Book Reviews Given

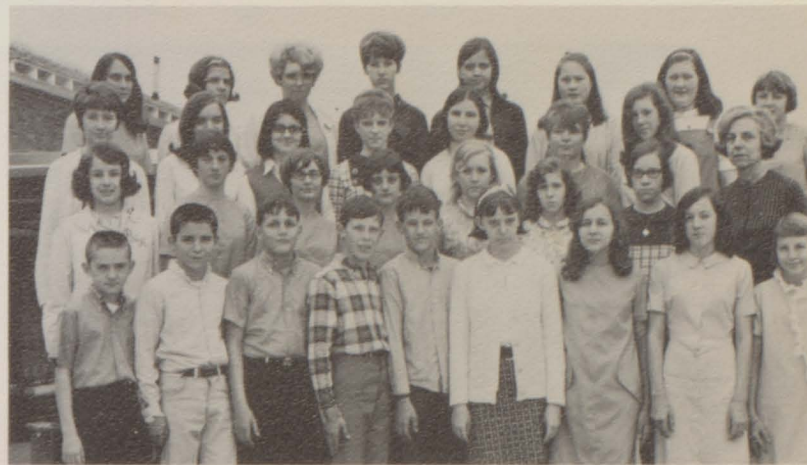
Book reviews, skits portraying episodes from books, and filmstrips from the library compose the programs produced by the Junior High Book Club.

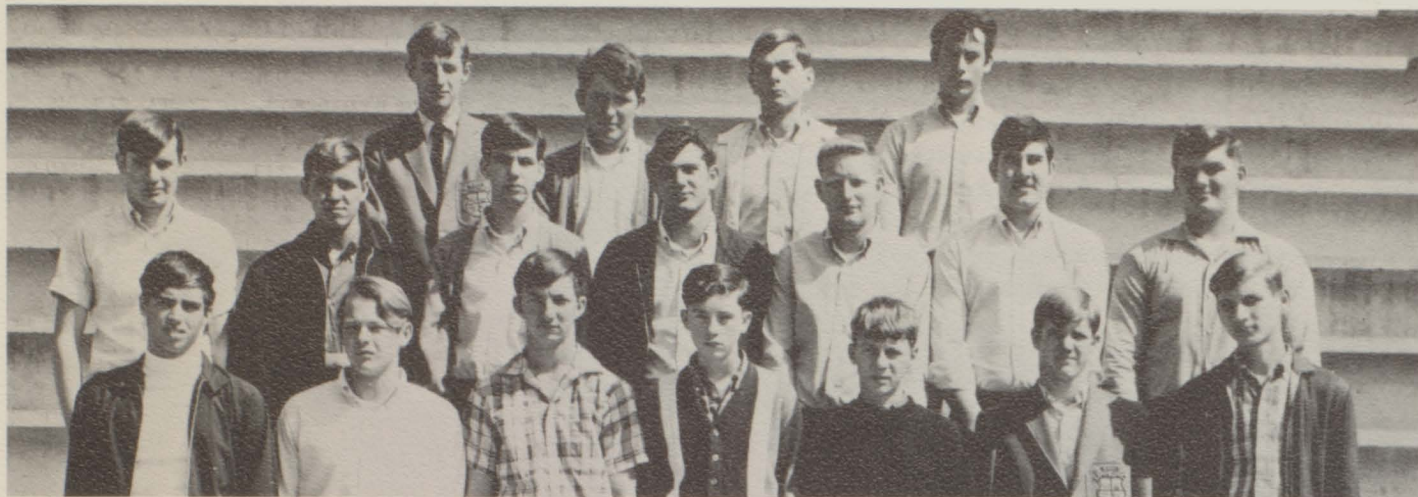

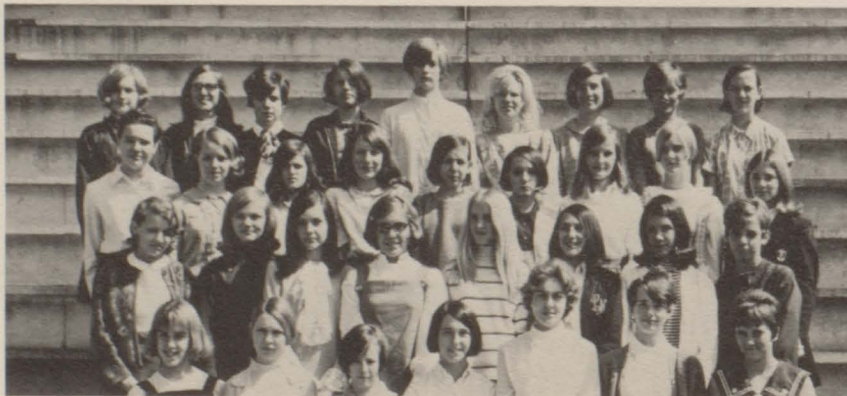

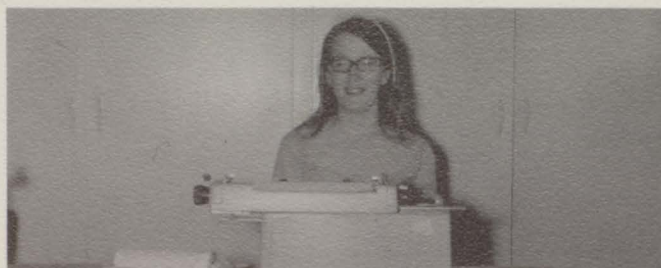

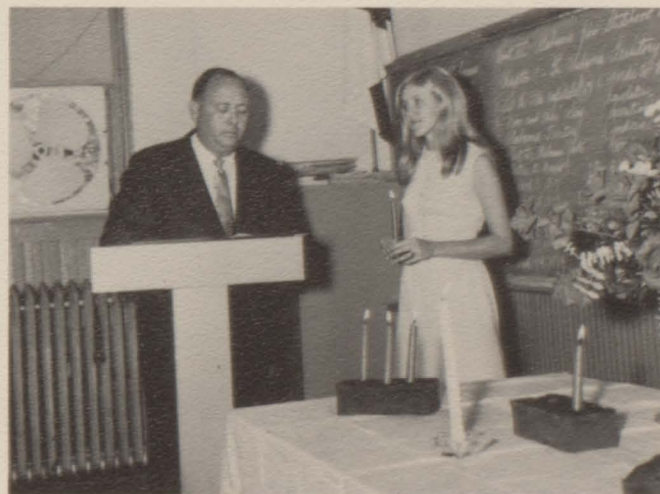

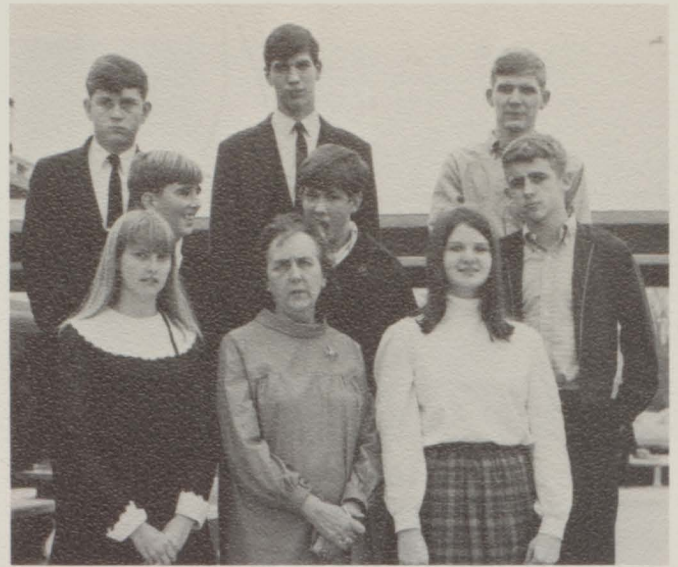
Scientists Expand Interest

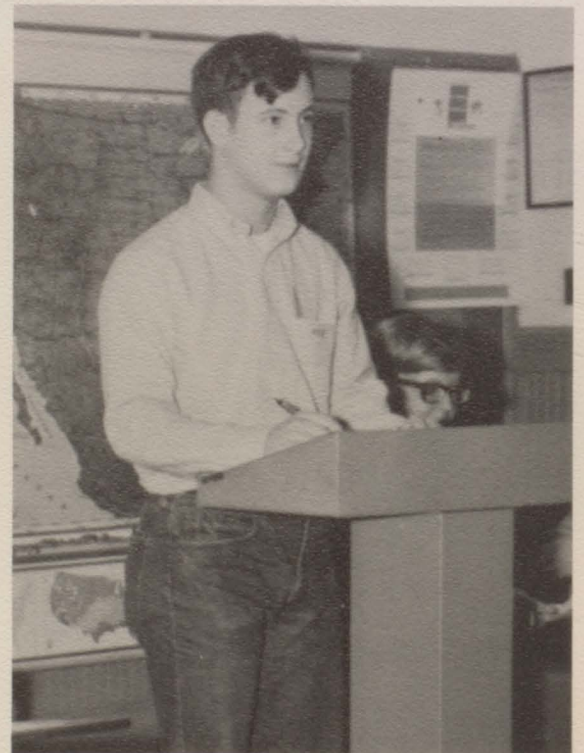

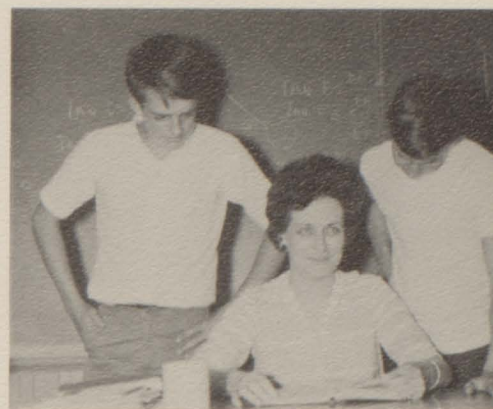

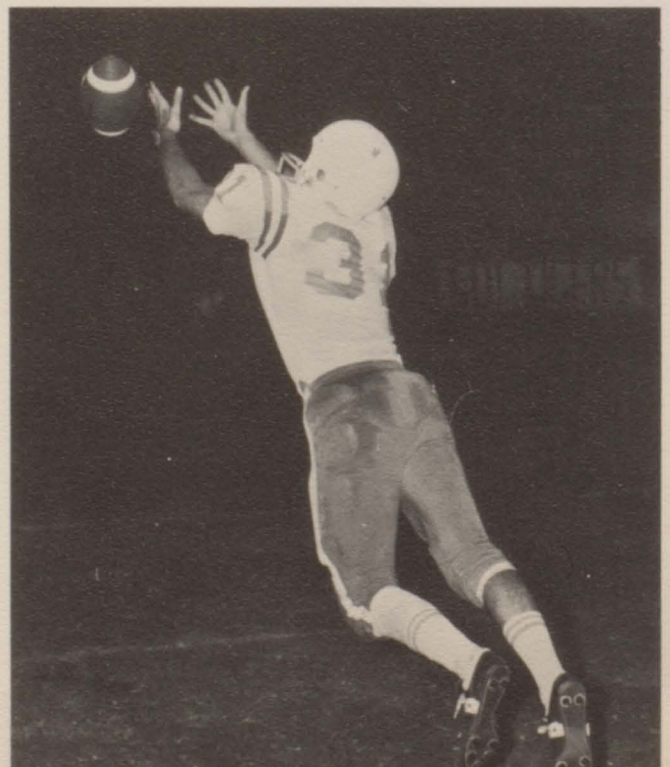
Though the Tigers were losing, the spirit and backing of the fans never faltered. An average

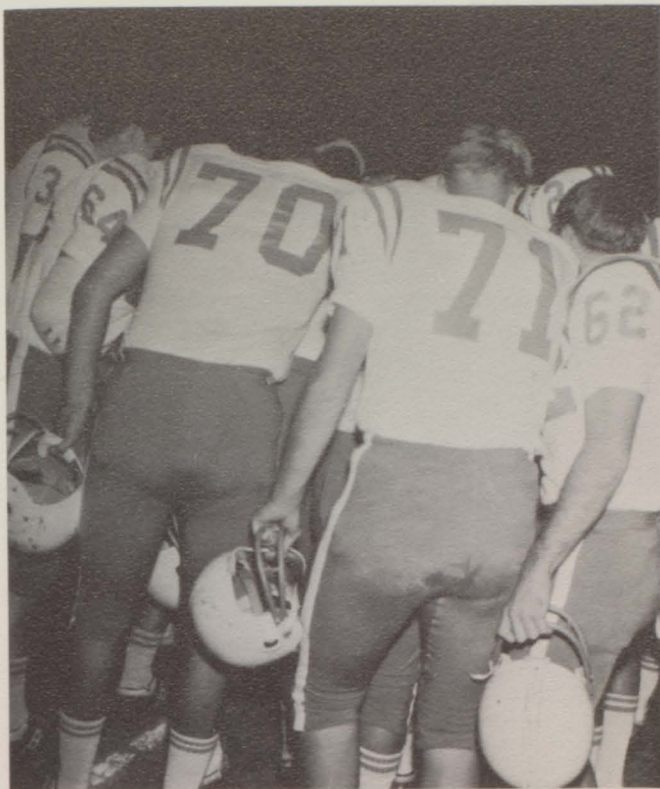

Captain Shane Gibbs (77) received a grant-in-aid to Florida State and also won All-County and lineman of the year.

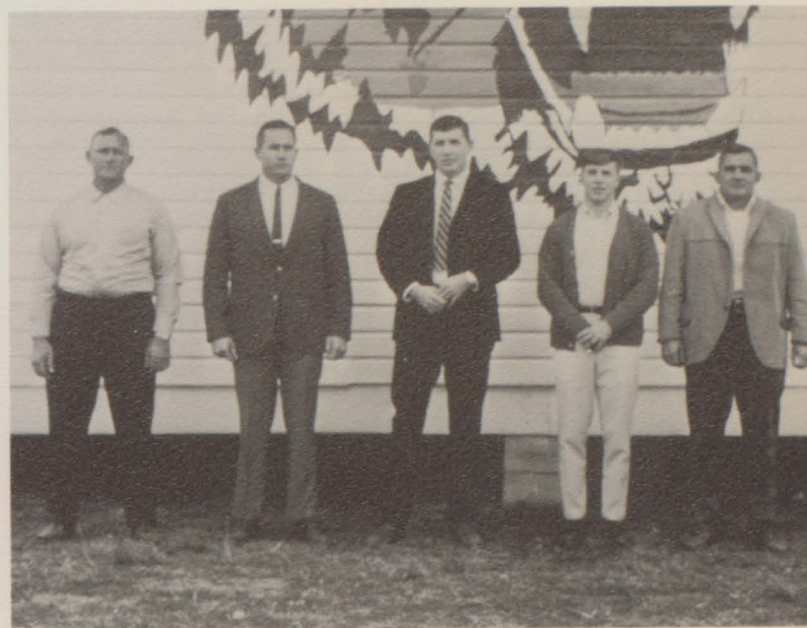

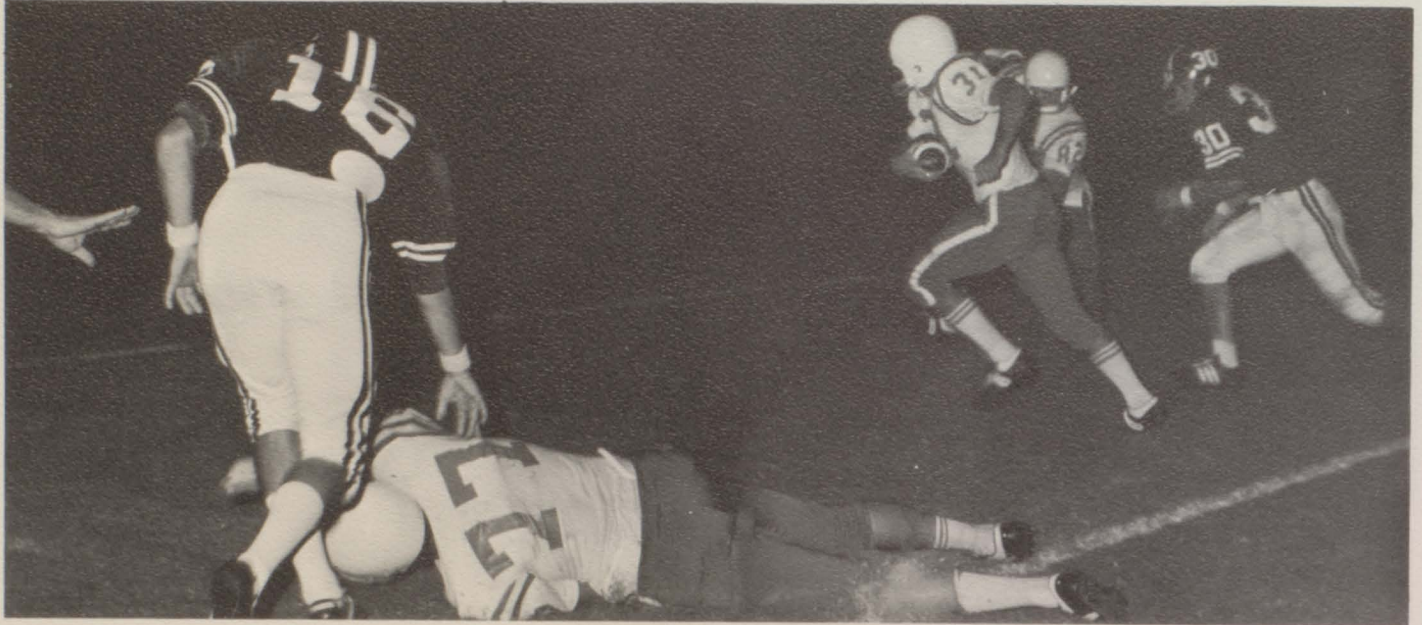
Tigers March Through Cadets

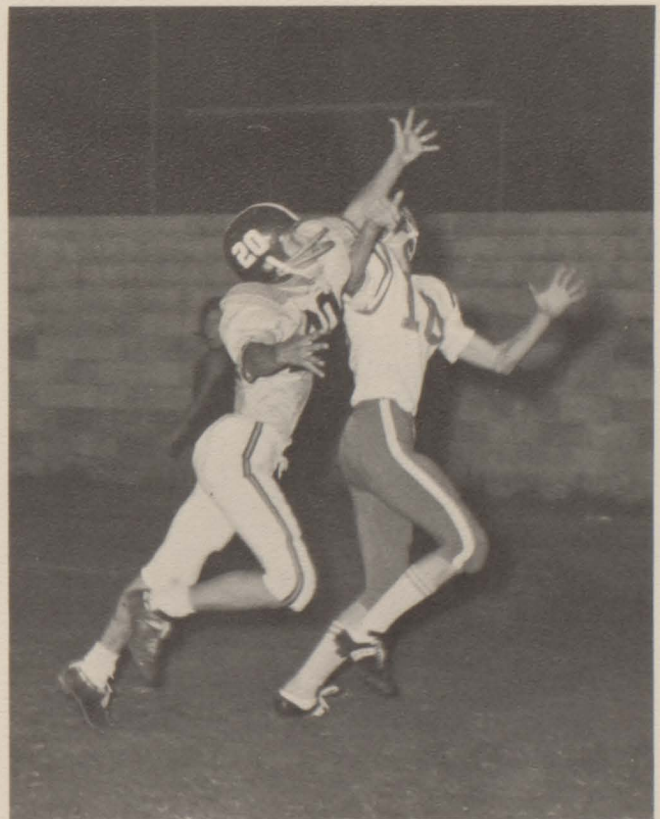
Bears Maul Tigers

Simmons Field in Bay Minette was the site of the game with the Robertsdale Bears. This was one of the hardest fought battles of the season.

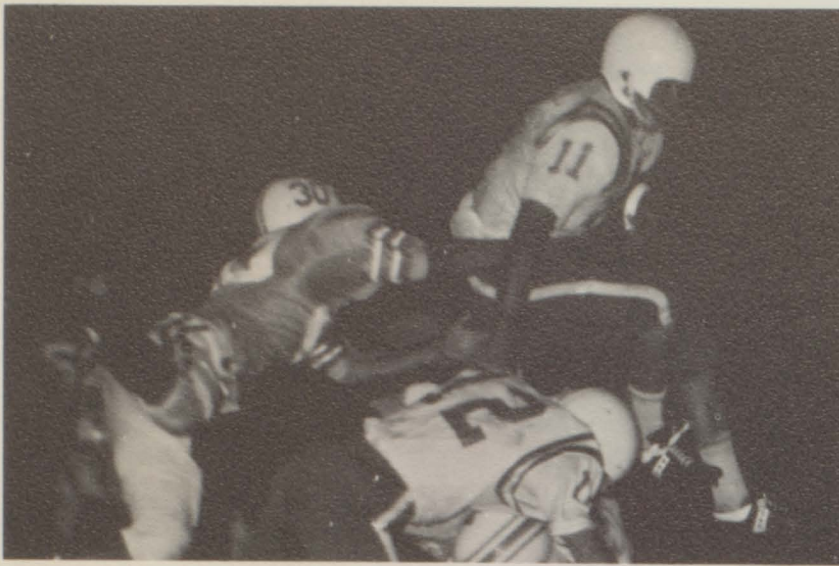

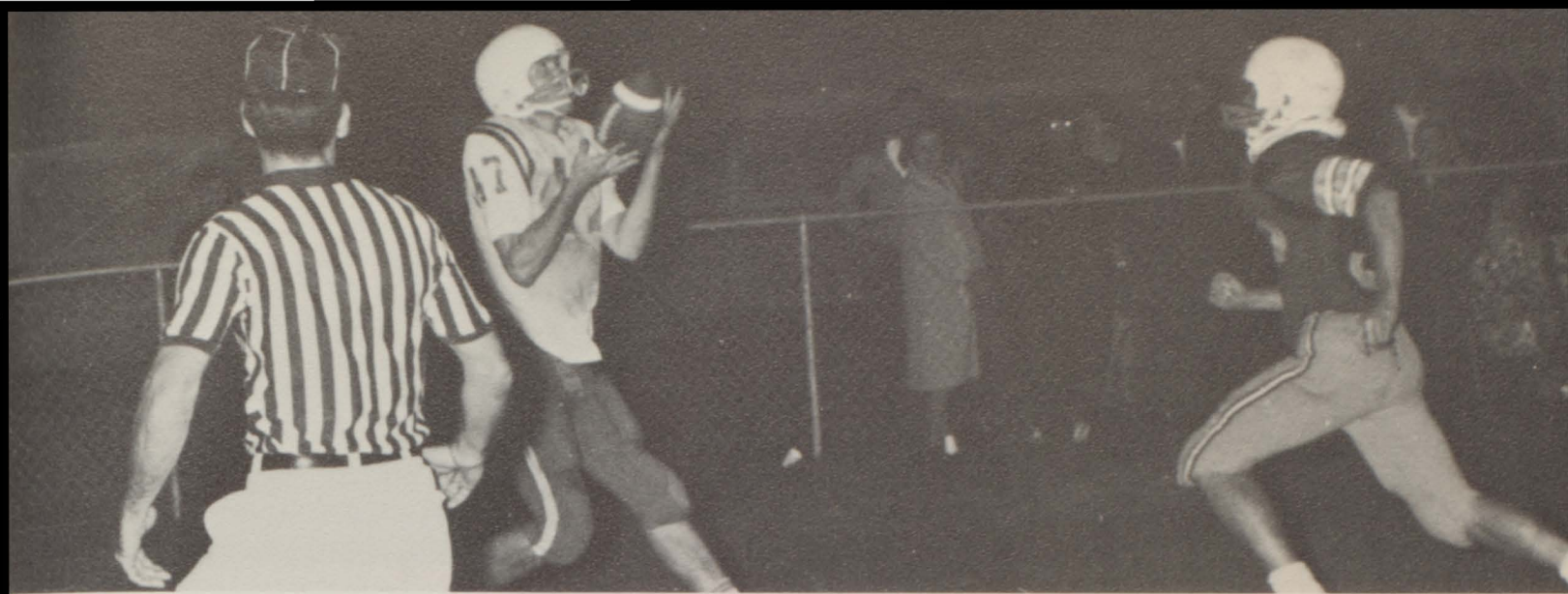
Rebels Raid Tigers

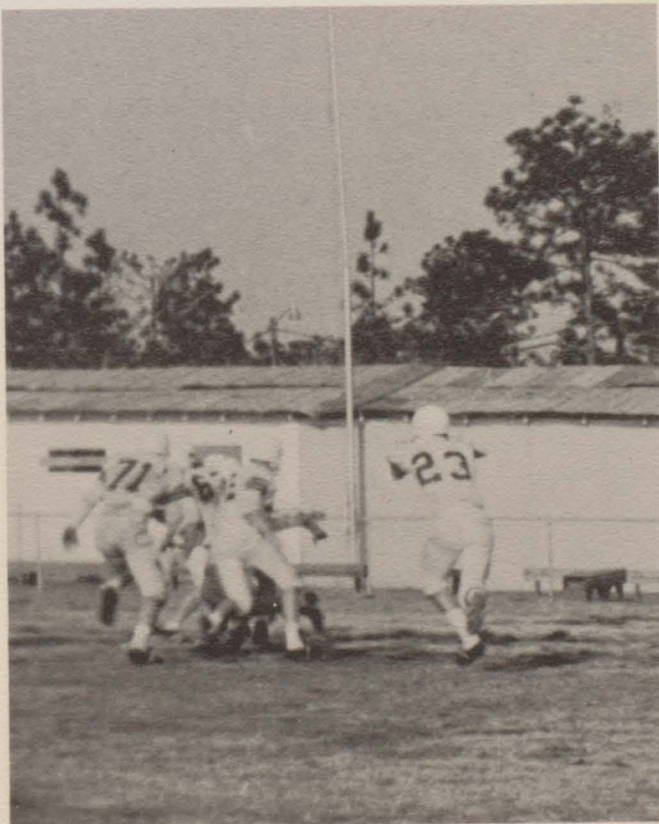

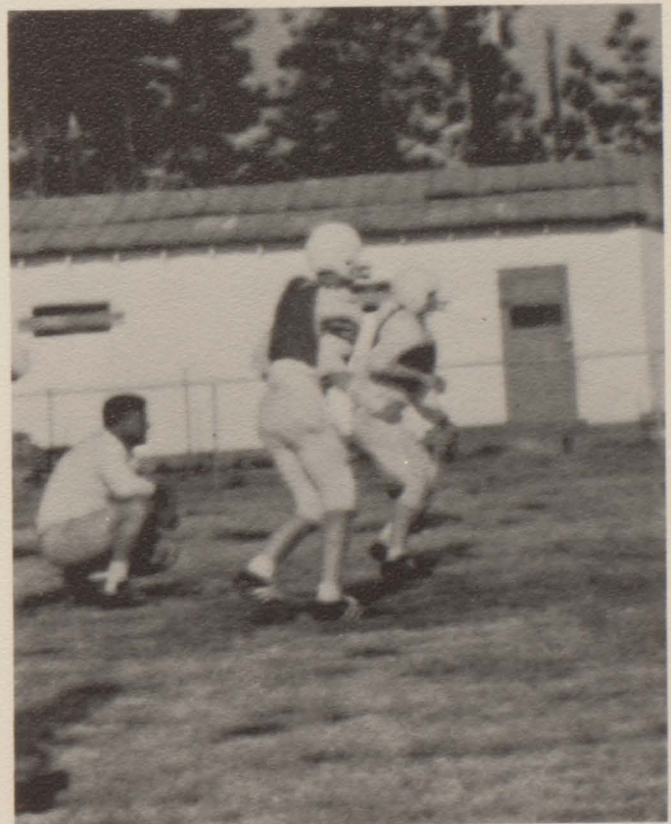
