## Projects Characterized Year's Activities

Home Economics I, II, and III, was taught this year under the supervision of Mrs. Jane Jones and assistant Mrs. Vera Means. Home Economics covered the areas of art in the individual and family, clothing and textiles, food and nutrition, home management, housing, and human development and the family, taught to 132 students of grades 10,11 , and 12 . Projects carried out by the girls included selling cookbooks, having bake sells, serving Key Club, and working on special projects for the deaf and blind of Talladega.
Vocational Agriculture taught by Mr. Byron Nall, instructed 110 students for this year. The Agriculture Department emphasized leadership and learning through competition. Students from Baldwin County High School competed against the schools in the State FFA contest which included Soil Judging, Live-Stock Judging and Dairy Judging.

Each student received special training in operating heavy equipment. Individual students worked on home projects on their own.

A special project for this year was the formation of a string-bank, which played only country and western hits. This band placed first in FFA County competition.
Industrial Cooperative Training, a program of training students in aiding them in future occupations was headed by Mr. Lewis Long. This year Mr. Long emphasized on expanding his program of training education to include an Industrial Selling and Buying course. Each of the 38 students had practical and theoretical training for a specific occupation. Through out the year, the I.C.T. program helped each student adjust to the demands that life had to offer, and kept the school informed with the business and industrial development as well. As well as training students, I.C.T. gave each student the opportunity to graduate from high school with experience in a definite occupation.

As one of the I.C.T. fund-raising projects the students engaged in a Turkey shoot. Also in honor of the students employer's, a special Employee and Employer banquet was held.
