



























Cheerleaders Win Honor












ATHLETICS

Tigers Rank 6 in State

With a state rating of 6 the Tigers left the campus by chartered bus for Legion Field in Birmingham to meet the Lions of West End, rated 3. The Tigers were defeated 24-6. During the regular season Bldwin's Bengals compiled 9 wins and one loss.

Twenty-two seniors, sixteen juniors and twenty-two sophomores composed the team which held its opponents to an average of 9 points per game while averaging 27 points per game.





Baldwin's Tigers Lengthen Win Streak to Twelve

Traveling to Semmes, the Tigers played their first game of the season against the Mary Montgomery Vikings. The Tigers, predicted underdogs, came out on top by mauling the Vikings 26-0.

Dominating the entire game, the Tigers chalked up 300 yards rushing and the defense held the Vikings to only 58 yards rushing. The Vikings completed two passes for a total of 4 yards. Greg Strom, Tiger fullback, scored first in the opening quarter by making a fantastic catch between two Mary Montgomery defenders and falling into the endzone. On the following kickoff, Harrison Mims jarred the Viking ball carrier loose from the ball and Scotty Langham recovered it on the Viking 46. The Bengals, with their bruising ground attack, moved the ball to the two-yard line. Halfback Paul Jones took the hand-off and plunged into the endzone.


Tiger defenders took their turn scoring when Mike Bishop intercepted a short pass and returned it 42 yards to paydirt. A pass from Ronnie Wiggs to Ronnie Richerson set up the final score. The pass went to the two-yard line and from there Paul Jones carried the ball in.

Bay Minette's fighting Tigers continued their winning streak by defeating the UMS Cadets by the score of 14 to 8.

Byrd-to Strom-passes seemed to be the winning combination for the Tigers. Greg caught touchdown passes of 30 and 19 yards. UMS struck first when Ronnie Richerson fumbled a punt on his own 49. The Cadets took advantage by marching in seven plays to paydirt. A two-point conversion made the score 8 to 0.

Bay Minette drew first blood when a Cadet receiver fumbled Erwin Arnold's punt. Scotty Langham was there to grab it for the Tigers on the UMS 32 yard line. Ronny Byrd and Paul Jones clawed their way down to the 22 where Byrd passed to Greg Strom, who took it in for a TD.

Defensive players Howard Welker and Phillip Brown dropped the quarterback several times. The final tally came late in the fourth quarter when Byrd ran it to the 35 yard line and a penalty moved it to the 20. The Byrd-Strom combination struck again and the Tigers came home victorious.




Mike Bishop, Chip Scivicque, and Paul Jones set to block as All-


County Danny Dorough scampers downfield with a Fairhope pass.

Winning their third victory of the season and their first home game, the Tigers took advantage of three Fairhope mistakes to beat the Pirates 19-7.

Tiger quarterback Ronny Byrd brought the Tigers out after Randy Watts recovered a Pirate fumble on the Bay Minette 25 yard line. Paul Jones burst through the line three times and picked up a first down. Byrd then hit Erwin Arnold with a pass and he manuvered his way to the 17 yard line. The drive was climaxed by Eddie Ingram, who sprinted 15 yards to paydirt.



Chuck Fletcher started the game off with an on-side kick. The Pensy Tigers were surprised and the home Tigers recovered the ball. Quarterback Ronny Byrd moved the Tigers to the 29-yard line of Pensacola. Ronnie Richerson caught a pass on the four-yard line, but a penalty nullified it. Pensacola took over on downs, and on third down for the visiting Tigers, Joe Pruitt intercepted an aerial. Byrd went to work on the opposing defense by picking them apart. Eddie Ingram, leading pass receiver for the Tigers, caught a 15 yarder down to the five. Greg Strom took it in from there for a TD. Byrd's conversion made the score 7-0 for the home Tigers. 
Tasting Bitter Defeat


Homecoming 1970 was a thriller. The Tigers defeated the Jackson Aggies, 21-14. Twenty-two seniors playing their last home game were captains.




Defensive end Howard Welker shows All-County form with a jarring tackle on a Theodore Bobcat.




Defensive halfback Joe Pruitt leaps to steal a Foley aerial.

Bay Minette's Tigers traveled to Atmore for their last game. The 50-6 score told the story.
















CLUBS








Bay Minette Interact Club Sweeps Awards at State






Members Strive to Maintain Their High Ratings







Schools Operate As A Unitary System

Baldwin County schools operated smoothly this year under court order. The court ruling defined public school districts that students living in those districts were compelled to attend. The dual school system was abolished with the initiation of total intergration. Baldwin County High School became the central senior high school and the former Douglasville High became Bay Minette Middle School.

Leading in the adjustment of the new school system was Superintendent of Education, Mr. W. Candler McGowan. Mr. McGowan has served Baldwin County for eighteen years. He received his Bachelor's degree from the University of Alabama and his Master's degree at Columbia University.

Policies and continued progress of the school system were responsibilities of the Baldwin County Board of Education. The Board, elected by the voters of Baldwin County, consisted of six men: Emanuel Davidson of Bay Minette, John McMillan of Stockton, Max Griffin of Foley, Paul Cleverdon of Summerdale, Dr. Ollie O. Jones, Jr. of Fairhope, and W. Candler McGowan of Bay Minette.





Instructional Resource Center Aids Teachers



Students Enter Annual Math Competition

All interested high school students were encouraged to participate in the 1971 Annual High School Mathematics Examination given on March 9, 1971. The contest was jointly sponsored by the Mathmetics Association of America, the Society of Actuaries, Mu Alpha Theta, and the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics. One-hundred and eleven students participated.

Tests consisted of multiple-choice type questions covering material from Algebra I and II and plane geometry. The highest scorer in the school, Keith Duck, was awarded a pin. The top three scorers, Keith Duck, Ronnie Stiers, and Dianne Sutton, entered the district competition.

Ten teachers taught 44 classes a day with an enrollment of 1,338 students. Junior High Math I, II, and III, Algebra I and II, plane and solid geometry, and introductory analysis were offered.









Students and Faculty Use Library Facilities

Two libraries attempted to provide maximum service and to promote maximum use of their resources by the student body and to provide material on all subjects and interests of 2,159 students.

Three librarians and twenty-two student assistants made up the library staffs. Services of student assistants included book lending, filing cards, arranging books on shelves and helping with bulletin board displays.

Materials were classified and catalogued according to the Dewey Decimal System. Books on the same subject were shelved together on open shelves within easy reach of students. Periodicals and audio-visual materials were available to faculty members upon request. Teachers were able to order classroom aids from the Materiel Center through the library.

The middle school library of over 5,000 books and the high school library of over 10,000 books included fiction, history, science, travel, biography and other non-fiction.

Circulation statistics proved that the library materials were used extensively. During the day, the average circulation of materials and books was from 80 to 104. The daily attendance in the libraries was from 130 to 150 students.

Vocational Students Rank High in Competition

Vocational Agriculture students placed first in the county in the public speaking contest, string-band contest, and the dairy judging contest. The department offered training in the following basic skills: welding, masoning, conservation and woodworking. Projects such as making gunracks and rebuilding lawn mower engines were carried out by students. Fifteen thousand seedlings were planted over the county.

Sewing, foods and nutrition, family budgeting, home management, personal grooming, and family relations were offered to one hundred and twenty-four girls in Home Economics I, II, and III. Barbara Capps entered in the county beef cook-off in Fairhope and won second place in the competition. Projects included selling cookbooks, designing bulletin boards and working on special projects for the deaf and blind in Talladega.

Industrial Cooperative Training enrolled thirty-one students. This program was designed to aid students in preparing for future job opportunities. A car smash was held to help raise money to buy books for their technical library. Students worked in the community as beauticians, mechanics, nurses, dental assistants, butchers, morticians and X-ray technicians.




Flag Flies in Spanish and French Classes




