## Tiger's Playoffs Result in Victory and Defeat

The Tigers got revenge on the Murphy Panthers by a score of 21-14 in the first of the State Playoffs.

Tim Meeks substituting for injured Ronnie Wiggs, hit on eight of thirteen passes for 115 yards and one T.D. Johnny Cabaniss rushed for 62 yards on six carries.

Ronnie Richerson scored first on a 21 yard run around left end, and Don Peterson converted the PAT. The second score came after Cabaniss went 23 yards to the one and Zahn Goodman scored. Meeks then threw to Richerson for the score. Clinching the game, Bob Wilters then intercepted on the ten where time ran out.

The Tigers approached the semifinals against number one rated Butler with a victory against Murphy. The Butler Rebels came into the game with a 9-1 record.

After the first quarter Bay Minette was leading 7-0, with Butler in possession on the ten yard line. The Rebels

carried it in on an off tackle plunge. The score then was 7-6. The ball turned over and over until the fourth quarter when Butler scored from the fifteen. They went for two and brought the score to 14-7. The Tigers on their final drive down on the eight yard line were intercepted, and time ran out.

Opening the season on September 3, the BCHS Tigers defeated Mary Montgomery's Vikings 12-0. The Tiger's put all 12 points on the scoreboard in the first quarter. The defense led by Harrison Mims, Bob Wilters, Kit Smith, and Don Peterson dominated the game as BCHS held the Vikings to only 11 yards total offense.

Wiggs passed 40 yards to split end Richerson for first BCHS score. Martin scored from 10 yards out for the Tiger's other score in the second quarter.

## Tigers Skunk U.M.S. Cadets, Sink Fairhope Pirates,

Victory number two for the Tigers came at the expense of the University Military School Cadets by the score of 13-0.

Playing in Simmons Field again, the Tigers shut out their second opponents in two weeks, and scored all their points in the first quarter. Again Ronnie Wiggs passed to Ronnie Richerson for the first score on a pass covering 19 yards. Chip Stone kicked the extra point. Roosevelt Martin scored from a yard out. Stone's extra point failed and then the Bengal defense took over. Wiggs completed 10 of 16 passes for 142 yards, with Richerson catching six for 102 yards.

Passing of Ronnie Wiggs to Ronnie Richerson and flanker Sonny Dobbins highlighted the Tigers third victory over the Fairhope Pirates.

Wiggs completed 14 of 22 passes for a total of 231 yards as the Tigers waxed the Fairhope Pirate team. Wiggs and Richerson put the Tigers on the board first on a 51 yard pass play. Wiggs passed to tight end Bob Wilters for a two point conversion.

In the second quarter Richerson, who caught nine for 130 yards, made a diving catch of another Wiggs pass for a 34 yard score. Sonny Dobbins scored the third touchdown as he carried a short pass from Wiggs 17 yards into the end zone in the third period.

Fairhope scored first in the fourth quarter on a 12 yard pass. A six yard Wiggs to Richerson pass in the end zone and a Wiggs to Zahn Goodman pass for the two point conversion put B.C.H.S. on the board again. Second team quarterback Tim Meeks guided the Tigers to their final score. Meeks passed to Dobbins, who had five catches for 122 yards, on the one yard line and after two tries Goodman scored. Stone's PAT was good and the final score was 35 to 14 .
"Opportunistic" is the way to describe the Tigers 41-6 victory over the Vigor Wolves. For the first score Wiggs hit Dobbins for 44 yards to the 10 and then Martin scored behind blocks of Blount and Fletcher. Three plays later Harvey intercepted a pass and returned it 42 yards to the Wolves 12 and two plays later Wiggs went around right end for the score. Stone kicked his first of five extra points of the game for a 13-0 lead. A.B. Corley recovered the kickoff on the eight yard line. Martin scored behind Gibbs on the next play. The next score came on a 53 yard bomb from Wiggs to Byrd still in the first quarter. In the second period Smith recovered a fumble and then Meeks hit Richerson in the end zone for the score. For the final score Richerson returned a punt 47 yards and then Mims scored from the one.

For the second consecutive year the Murphy Panthers destroyed B.C.H.S.'s dreams of an undefeated season as the Panthers clawed the Tigers 43-27 in Ladd Stadium.
The first score came with 29 seconds remaining in the first quarter on a 15 yard pass to Richerson, Stone kicked the PAT. Murphy scored four plays later. Porter fumbled the kickoff on the Tiger 20. Murphy recovered and scored. With the PAT the score was 14-7. Murphy scored again in the second period on a four yard run, but Fletcher blocked the PAT. B.C.H.S. scored eight plays later when Richerson made an unbelievable catch between two defenders for 33 yards to the three. Goodman scored on two yard drive. The extra point missed. Porter returned the second half kickoff 86 yards for a TD and a 2 point pass from Wiggs to Goodman put the Tigers ahead 21-20. Murphy came right back for a score on a 15 yard run and a two point conversion. B.C.H.S. closed the gap with Wiggs hitting Richerson for six yards and six points. Murphy scored the final TD of the game.

After an open date, the Tigers traveled to play the John Shaw Rebels in Mary Montgomery High School's stadium. The Tigers pulled out a hard 27-7 victory. Shaw scored first after recovering a fumble by Martin on the opening kickoff, and for the first time this season the opposition had scored before the Tigers. Stewart recovered a fumble on the Rebel five. Wiggs scored two plays later around right end. The PAT failed. In the second quarter, Wiggs passed to Goodman for a TD and then hit Wiggins for 2 points. The Tigers struck again on a 58 yard bomb from Wiggs to Richerson. Tim Meeks scored the Tigers' only second half touchdown.

A defensive and kicking game, combined with a running attack, supplied BCHS with an 18-6 victory over Foley before 6,000 fans in Simmons Field.

Going to the air only when necessary, The Tigers rushed for 138 yards. Kickoff man Peterson proved to be a valuable asset as he booted the ball into the Foley end zone on four of five attempts. Near the end of the first quarter, the Tigers came out in a Power I, instead of their usual Pro Set. Wiggs scrambled 28 yards for a TD after dropping back to pass. The PAT failed. Foley tied the score in the third period. Martin scored the last two touchdowns from 3 and 1 yards out to clinch the game.

## Tigers Cream Theodore Bobcats, Burn Blue Devils

The Tigers, entered the Satsuma game as the state's number four rated team in the 4-A division. Wilters intercepted Satsuma's first pass of the game. On the first play, Wiggs passed to Martin for a TD. Peterson kicked the PAT. Eight plays later the Gators scored. Satsuma then returned an intercepted pass 44 yards to the nine. After running four plays with no gain the Gators settled for a 24 yard field goal and a 9-7 lead. After the kick-off BCHS drove 80 yards for the winners touchdown. Martin scored from a yard out, making the final score 13-9.

The running of Cabaniss and Richerson combined to lead the Tigers to a 44-0 Homecomming victory over the Theodore Bobcats as BCHS moved closer to a State Playoff berth.

Richerson scored the first touchdown on a 20 yard pass reception from Wiggs and later ran a three yard pitchout for a TD in the third period. Goodman had a 3 yard score and Cabaniss scored from five yards out, while Meeks ran 13 yards for TD.

## Opens In Fall

The Bay Minette Area Vocational Center offered training in a variety of trades for students who did not wish to adopt a college preparatory curriculum. Courses were offered in business and office education, child care and guidance, clothing and alterations, horticulture and floraculture, drafting, welding, mechanics, building and construction, refrigeration and air conditioning, and radio, television, and electronics. Three credits were given for each class.

The 23rd Annual High School Mathematics Examination was given on March 14 at Baldwin County High. There were 60 students taking the test. 5,239 students took the test from 92 schools in Alabama. Richard Middleton, David Clemmons, and Hamp Bryant placed one, two, three, respectively, for our school. The test was administered by Mrs. Martha Howell, Guidance Council, and graded by Mr. James Glasgow, geometry teacher.
