
Hardworking Seniors Make


















Bengals:

BCHS 14 — Fairhope 18




BCHS 28 - Williamson 0

BCHS 7 — Foley 13



BCHS 14 — Murphy 6




















Dig, Set, Spike . . . Volleyball Is Out Of Sight

This year's convention was held at Gulf Shores and sponsored by the Bay Minette Interact Club.






















Sharing Christ's Love



a Boys Beauty Contest and helping needy children at Christmas. All of these happenings helped produce students who are ready to lead the businesses of tomorrow.





Training in vocations is vitally important, and students of Baldwin County High School as well as the people of Bay Minette have reason to be very proud of the facility.




























"Go and look again at the roses. You will understand now that yours is unique in all the world. Then come back to say goodbye to me, and I will make you a present of a secret."


















The little prince went away, to look again at the roses.
