


















The Thoughts Of Man

Just like butterflies man is free. We are free to be what we want even though it might hurt someone. But freedom is our own decision or we can be enslaved by our desires, habits, and dreams.



Two roads diverged in a yellow wood. And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;


Then took the other, as just as fair, And having perhaps the better claim, Because it was grassy and wanted wear; Though as for that the passing there Had worn them really about the same,

I shall be telling this with a sigh Somewhere ages and ages hence: Two roads diverged in a wood, and I I took the one less traveled by And that has made all the difference.















Bill Beatty Receives DAR Good Citizenship Award




Excitement, Fantasy And Fun Fill





BCHS 6 — FAIRHOPE 21



BCHS 7 — FOLEY 20



BCHS 0 — ATMORE 0







Success Again

Sparkled by a dazzling Globetrotterstyle warmup and equally flashy ball players, BCHS basketball produced one of the finest records in the county. Under the leadership of Coach Charles Pridgen, the Tigers swept to a season of 18 wins and 8 losses. The Tigers captured the Baldwin County Championship for the second year in a row and placed second in the Region 2 Sub Area 1 Tournament, losing to McGill in the finals of a poorly officiated game.

Joseph Naves captured top honors for the Tigers being placed on three all tournament teams, and on the All State first team by the Birmingham Post Herald. Joseph also represented Region 2 for the South in the All Star game.





Consider why a Grandma comes Running on the double Whenever loved ones need her In sickness or in trouble.


