## Preparing for '77



Coach Lyle Underwood told the new team when practice would start and gave a short pep talk. Nobody said much because most were nervous or were wondering what this next season would bring.




















The '77 football team had more than the usual number of new-comers and fewer than normal seniors. This season was predicted to be a year for growth. The few seniors did not want it to be.




## A Year for Growth












The offense got going and scored a touchdown with only eleven seconds left in the half and then roared back with two more in the third quarter to clinch the game.




#### BCHS 6 Satsuma 14



## Winter Formal Success Despite Small Showing







Teachers do not enjoy giving semester tests and students certainly do not enjoy taking them. Unfortunately, they are something which must be endured.
















# Volleyball . . . Dig It!







## Seniors of '78 Doing







# Linda Peterson Named Outstanding VICA Student at Banquet






BEETHOVEN MUSIC CLUB














The 1977-78 Bowl Team traveled to WALA-TV Studio in Mobile to compete in the High School Bowl.
