
SPENDTHRIFT

This Baldwin County High School love card of many pages is dedicated to Mrs. Mildred DeLoach and her family; her impressions on our school are deep.

Learning . . . patriotism . . . making tradition . . . breaking tradition . . . and all the while, "Go Tigers!" All of the above mentioned serve to partially describe nineteen years of teaching performed by Mrs. Mildred DeLoach.

In almost two decades at BCHS, Mrs. DeLoach taught approximately three thousand individual students. If all the hours that teenagers spent in Mrs. DeLoach's room were added together, the sum would be an astronomical two million, four hundred seventy-five thousand, seven hundred fifty hours.

Miss Mildred Tippen was born on August 21, 1917 in Tuscaloosa but was brought-up in Birmingham. In 1942, Miss Tippen began her first teaching job in Bibb County. The job paid one hundred twenty-five dollars a month. After nine years of friendship with Mr. Sid DeLoach, Miss Tippen married him on December 17, 1954. Almost two years later the DeLoach's added a new member, Brenda, their only child, to the family.

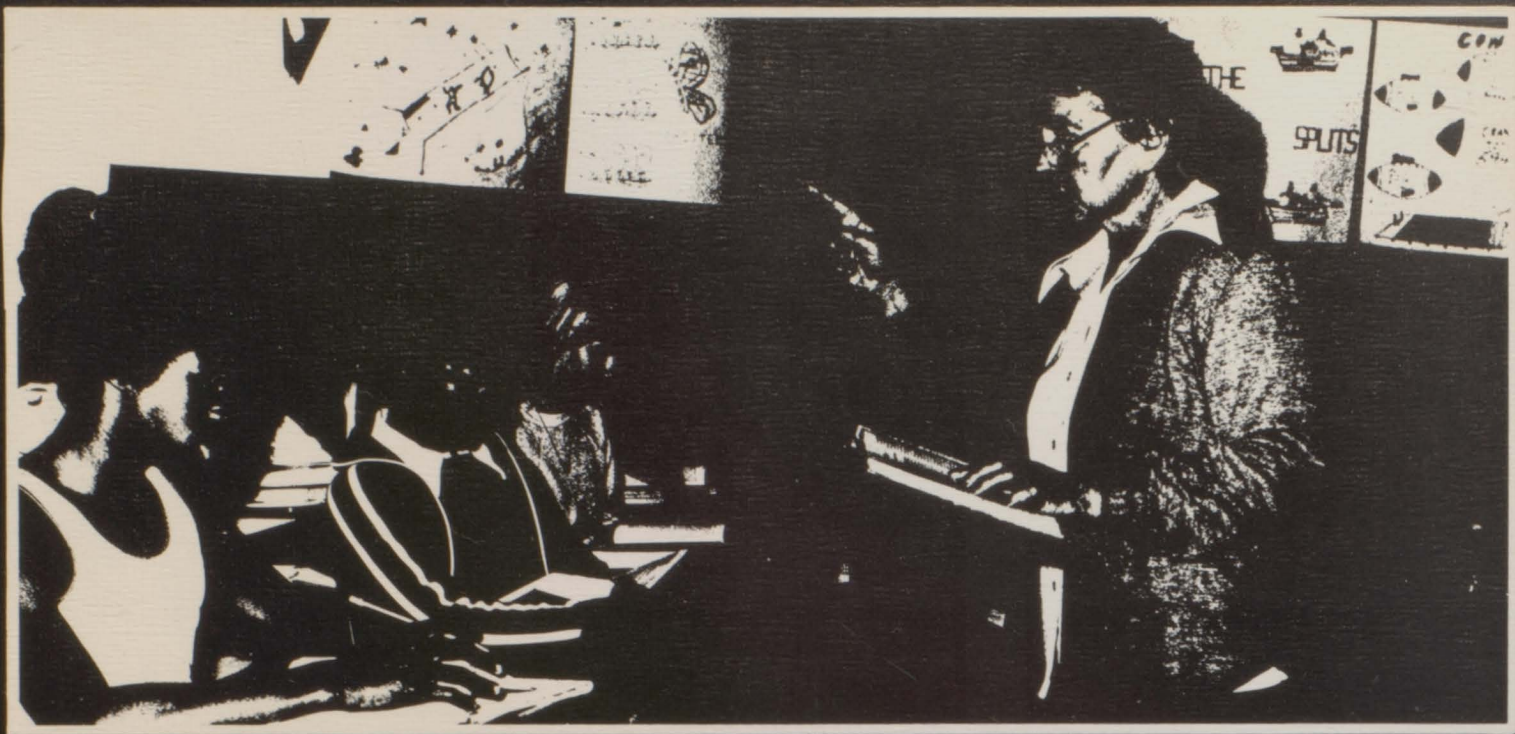
Mrs. DeLoach graduated from the University of Alabama on August 20, 1964 with a Master of Arts and later added a Master in Guidance. She took further graduate courses in her field as late as 1976.

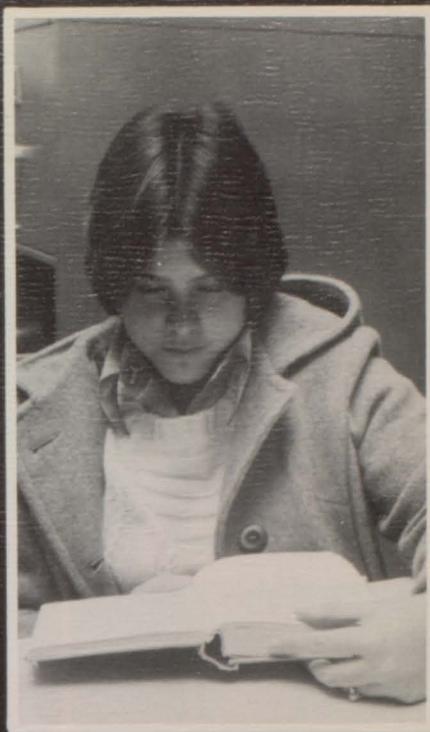
As an English teacher at Baldwin County High School, Mrs. DeLoach had a natural talent as well as experience. Besides teaching in formal classroom, for several years Mrs. DeLoach sponsored the school writing booklet called "SCRIBBLE." The BCHS teacher also edited a book written by Kay Nuzum.

Mrs. DeLoach spent much time on the large task of educating persons with learning disabilities. She authored a large part of a book which was supported financially by state and federal grants and which is now used widely in Alabama and seven or eight other states. Miss Katherine Steedley, Supervisor of Secondary Education, commented more than once, "She (Mrs. DeLoach) was the only person who could really relate to this type of student (slower students) as well as the advanced student." Being one of the most experienced members of the BCHS faculty, Mrs. DeLoach became a basic part of the "establishment," but all the while she did keep a certain amount of individuality. In 1971, Mrs. DeLoach became "almost as famous as Pat Sullivan" by wearing the first pants suit ever worn by a lady teacher at work. "Pants are warmer," Mrs. DeLoach told the *Tiger's Roar* staff. When asked if she might wear a maxi or mini sometime in the future, Mrs. DeLoach said she had no plans to further shock the school.

Students and faculty appreciated this teacher and held her in highest esteem for giving so much of herself to enrich our lives. The BALCOALA is proud to dedicate this 1979 edition to the memory of a very great, courageous, committed, and talented real person.

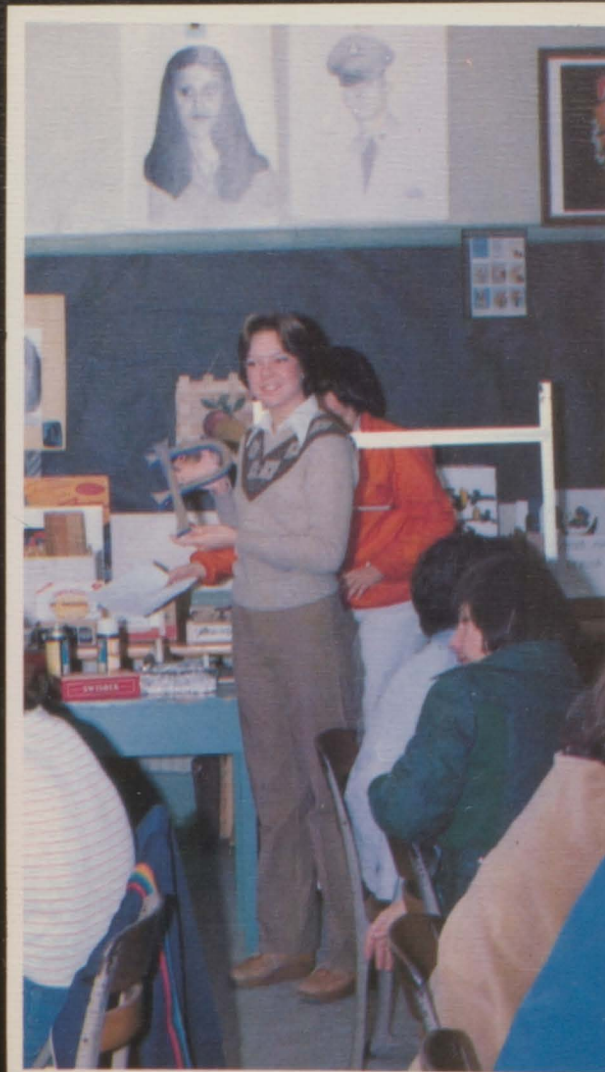

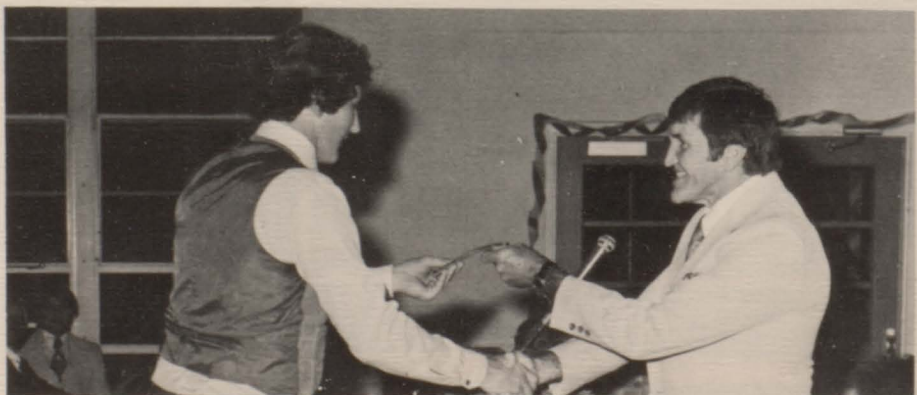

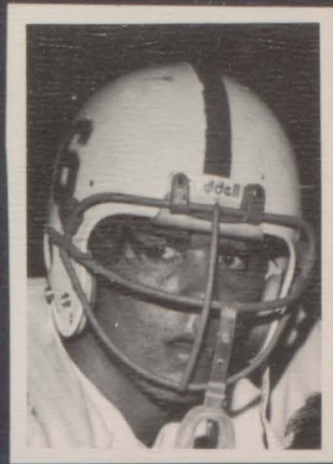


In time the schools of the world, by teaching real, applicable, and enlightening ideas, help to create a better quality of thoughts in the minds of their students.

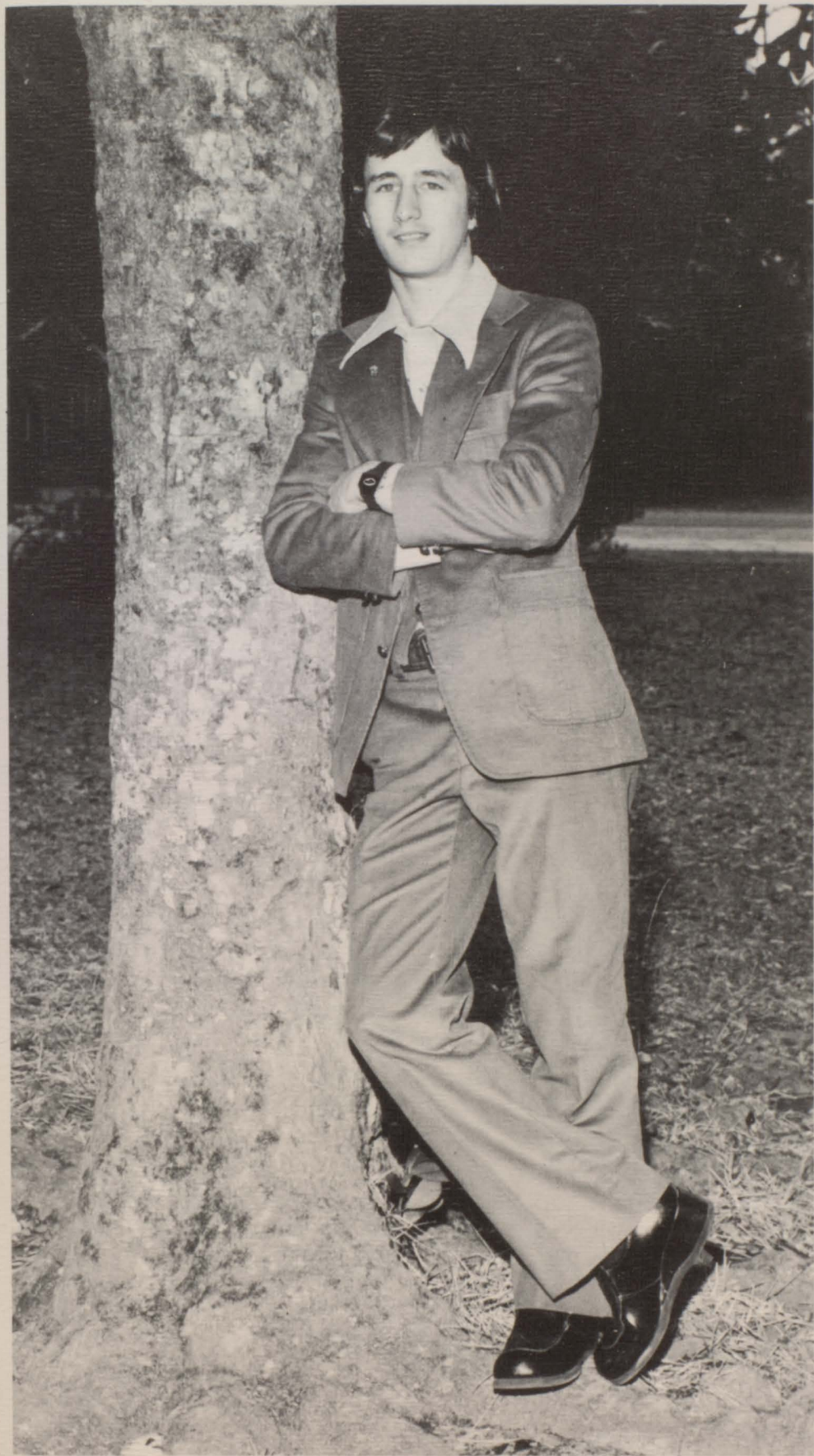


The Dirty Half-Dozen

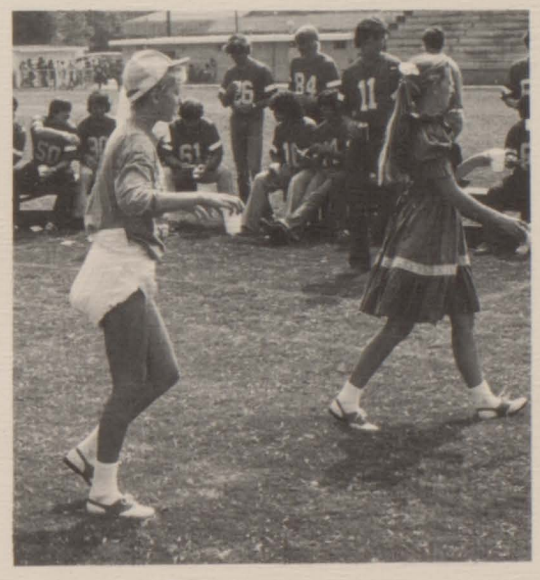

Pamper Themselves!

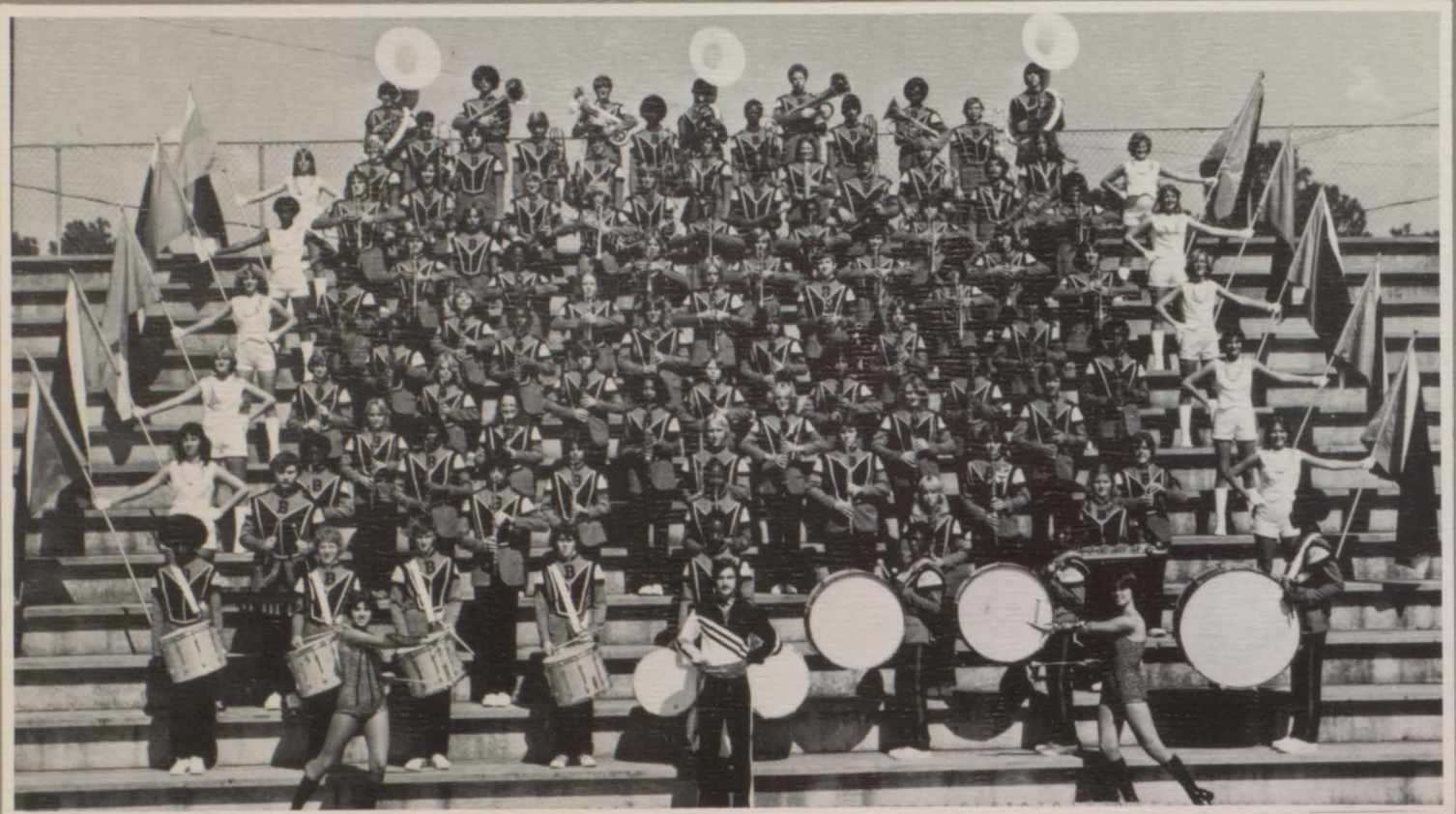

The B.C.H.S. Stage Band



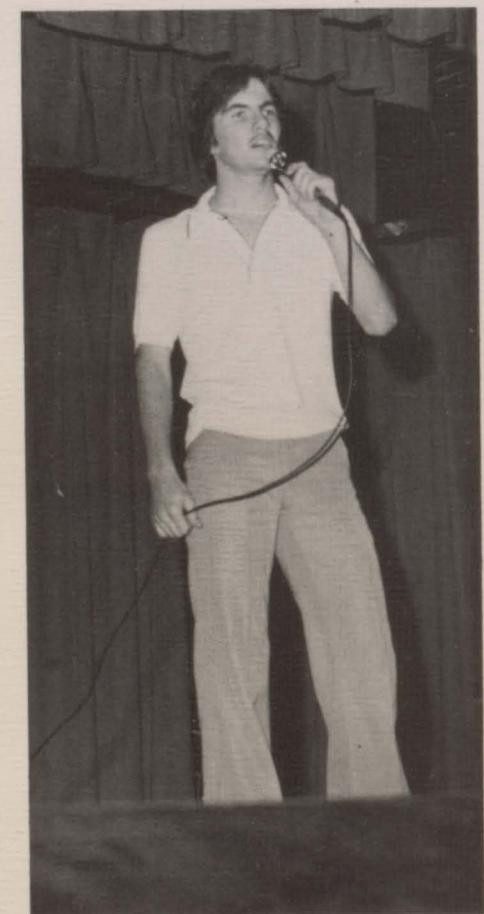
Harmonizing on classical to contemporary, pop, disco, country, and rock, the Baldwin County High School stage band consistently thrilled their peers, parents, and audience.

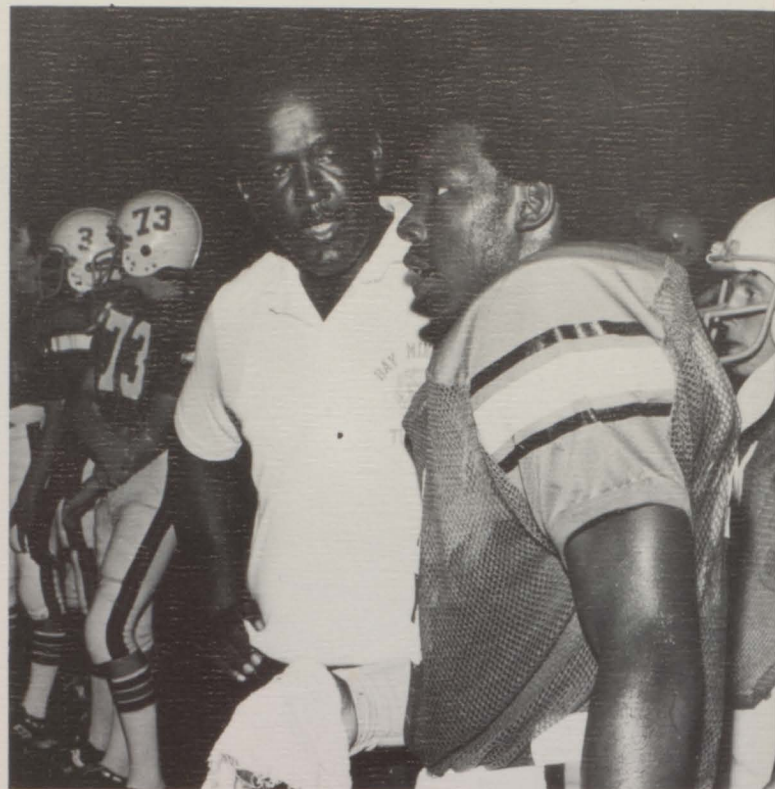
A question and answer interview with Coach Lyle Underwood about the Tiger football season:

Q: What proved to be some of the problems this year?

A: "I feel we didn't run the ball in the first part of the season like we should. Considering the size of our lineman and the physical strength of our boys, we should have moved the ball better, but I think we improved each ball game. By the time we reached the final game, we were were moving the ball much better and blocking better. One reason — besides more maturity — is the fact we had more time with a group of boys who had not played together very much to get to learn the plays better. We had to make some changes that we never would have anticipated during the season."

Q: Could you sum up the season?

A: "I feel it was disappointing, because I don't think that I've been as optimistic prior to the start of a season than I was this year. I sincerely felt we would go undefeated this year. As a whole this was one of the very best groups of boys I've had since I've been coaching."

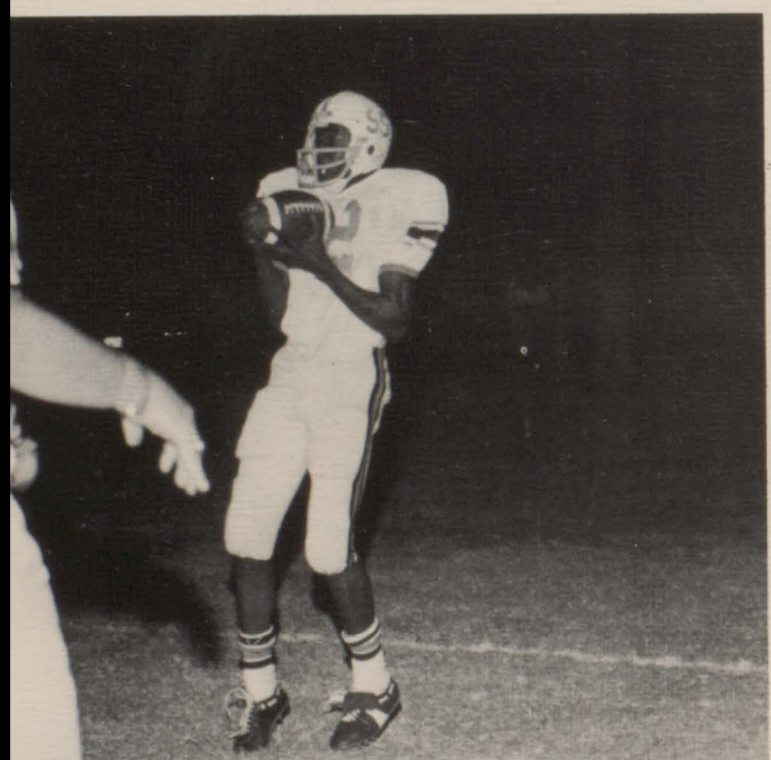

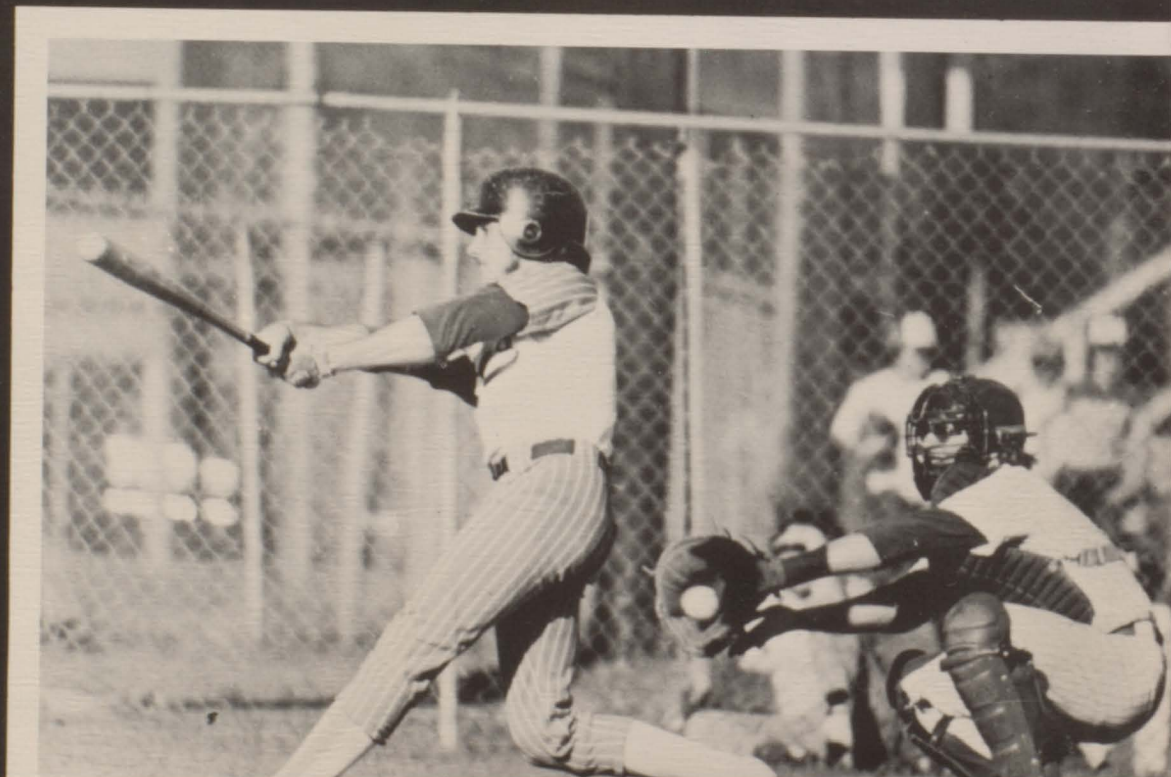
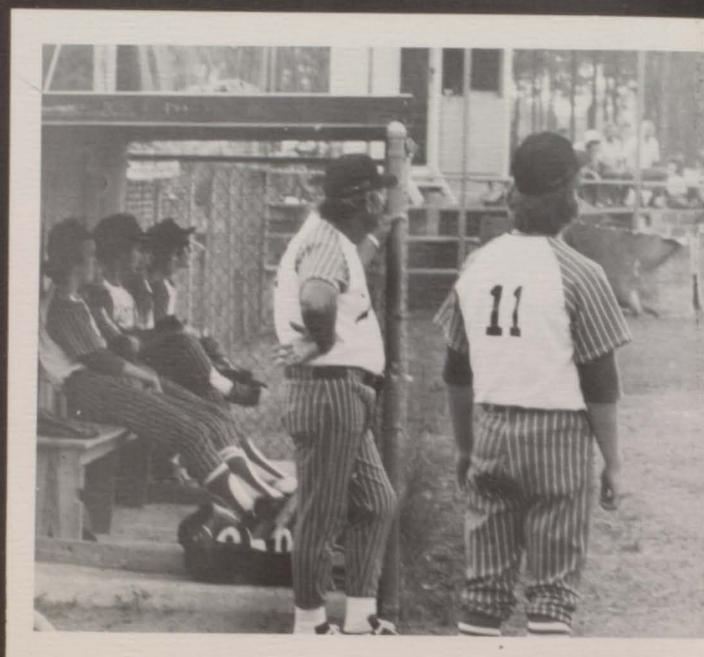
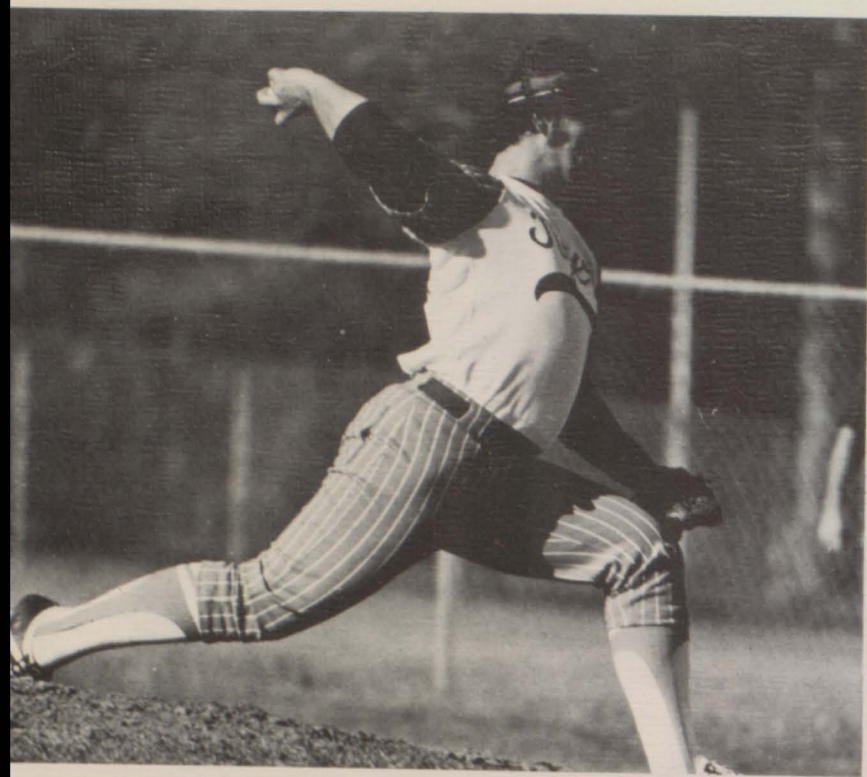




Baseball Fever . . . Catch It To Win!

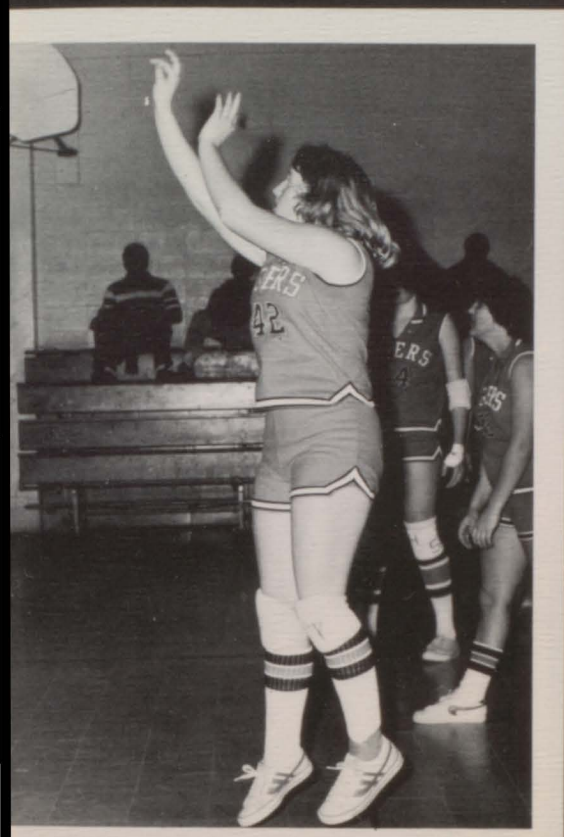
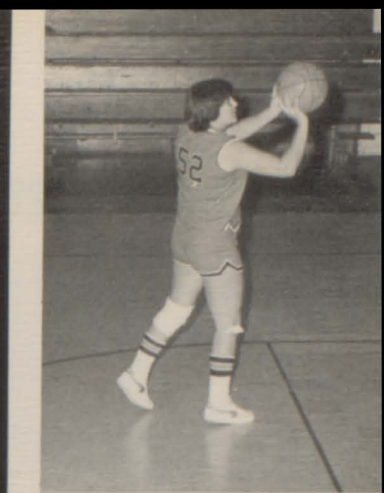
Girls' Basketball: We've Only Just Begun

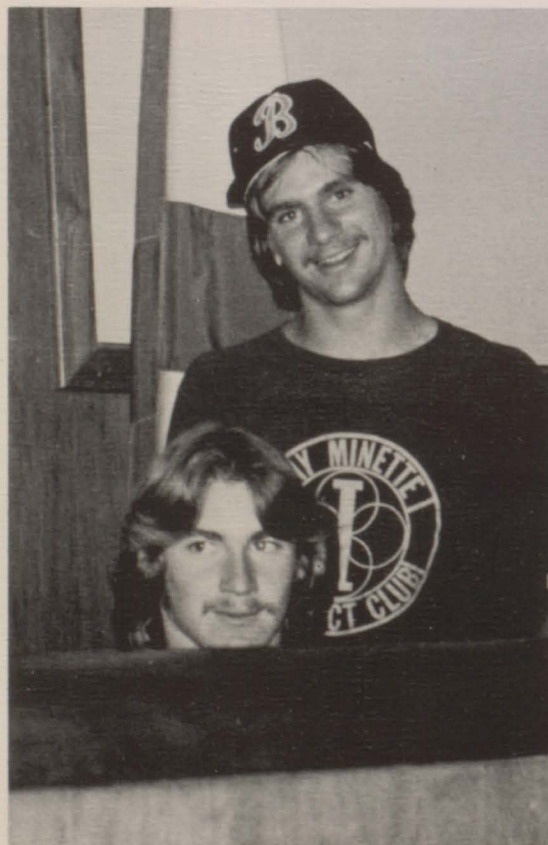
Interact Moves On Up

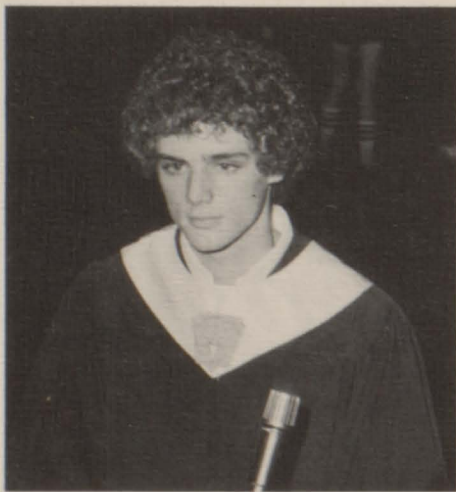

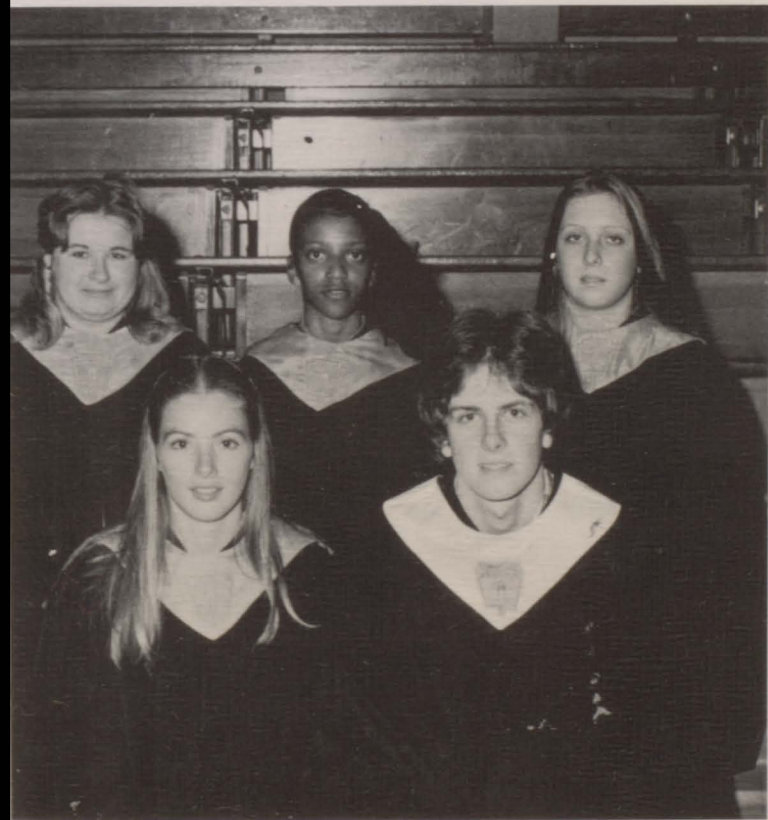

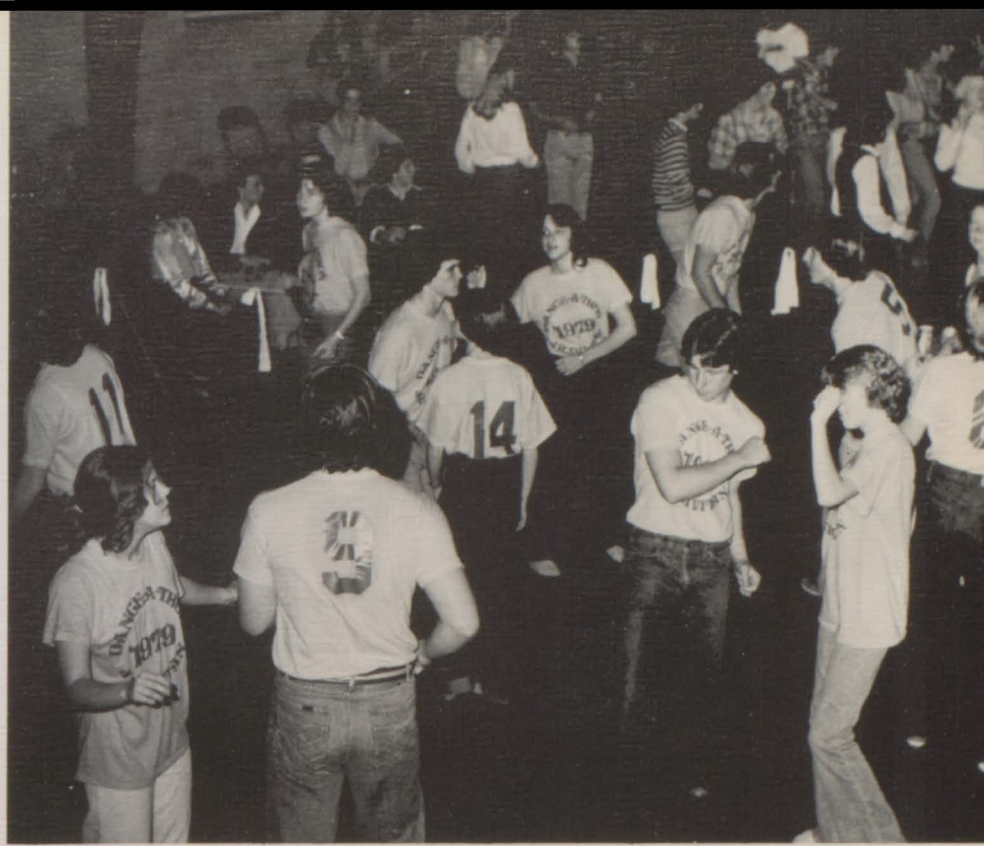

F.B.L.A. — Meets Practical Needs

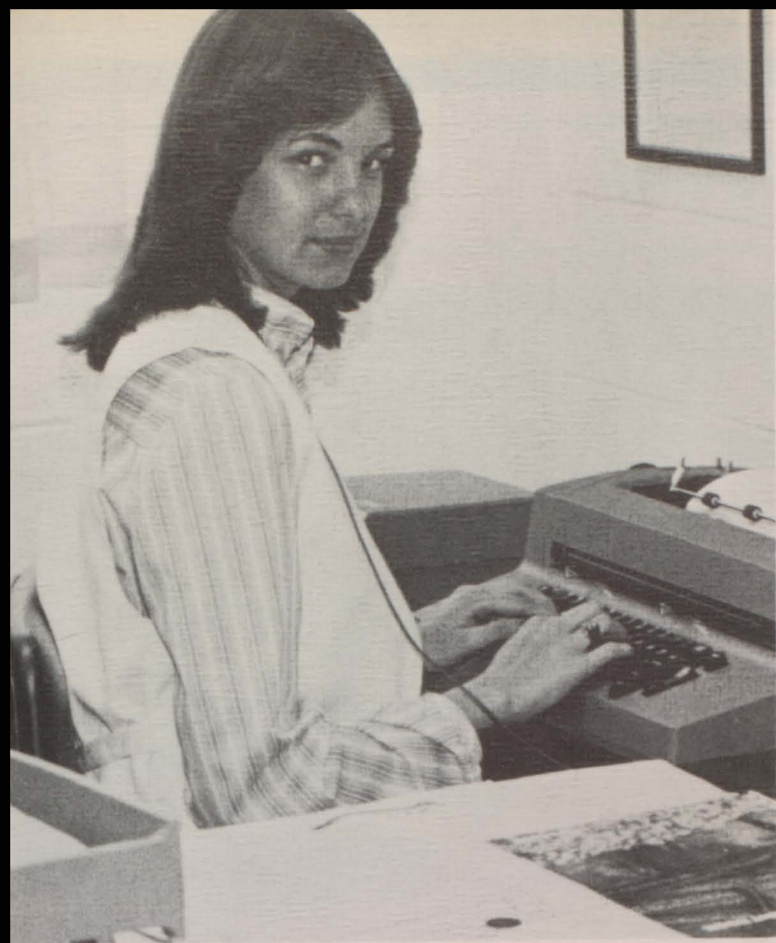

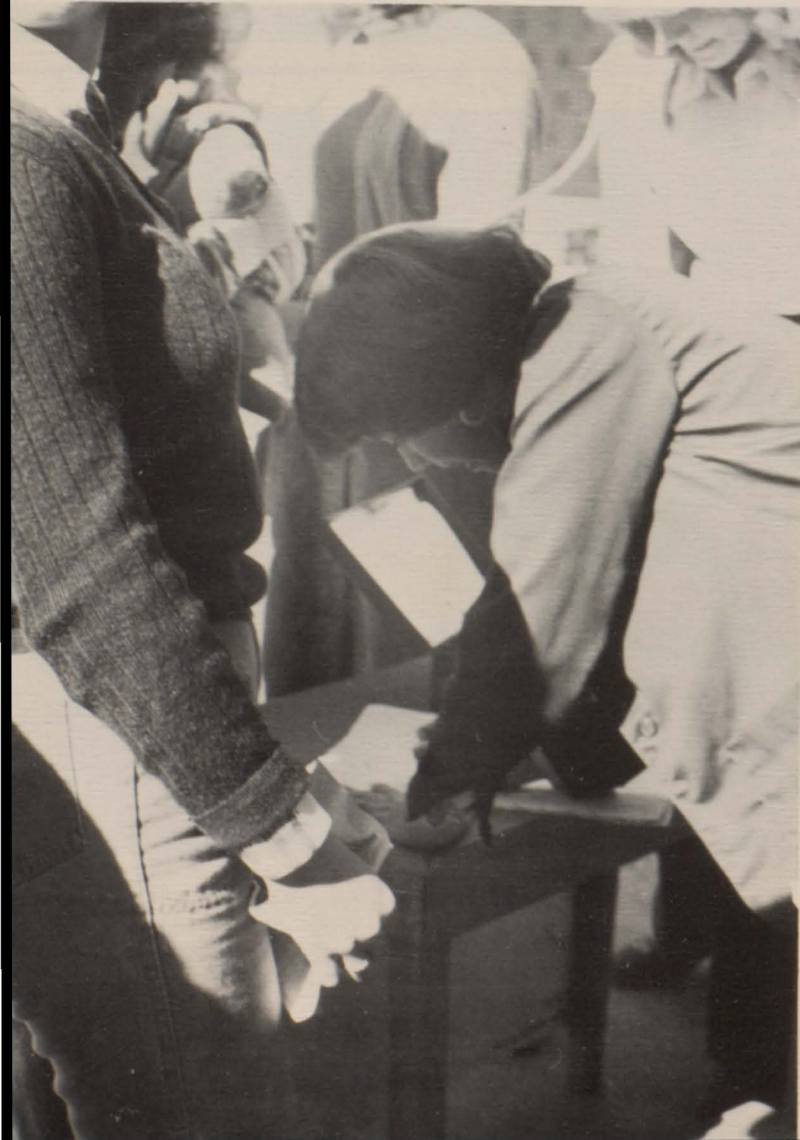




S.A.F.E.

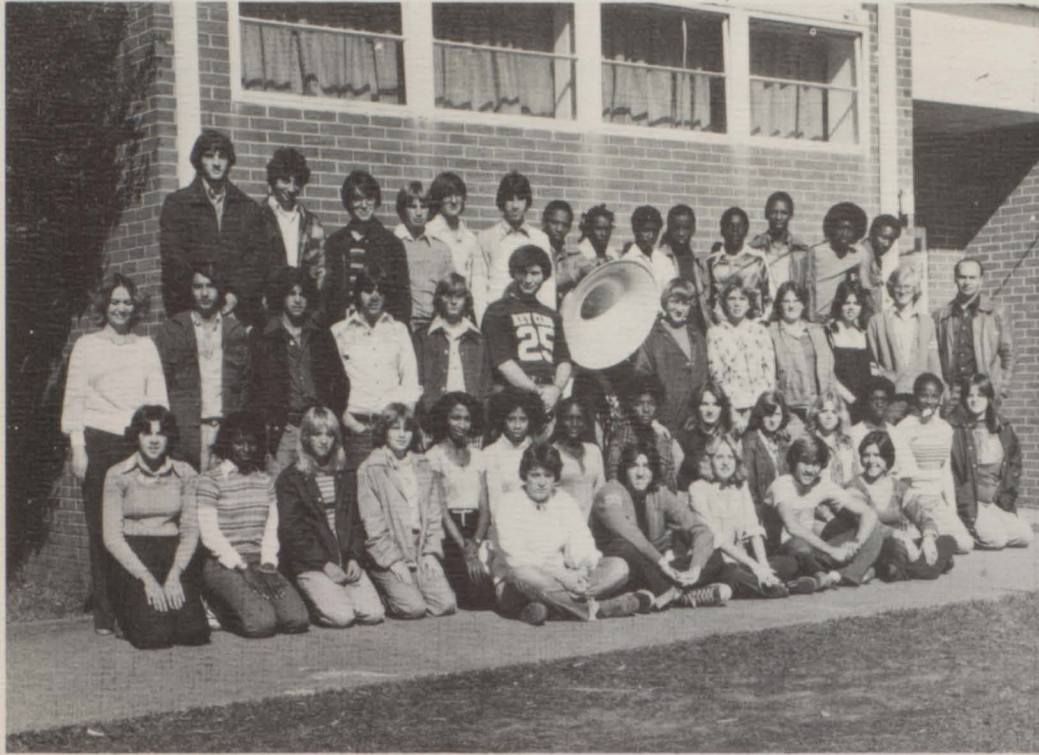

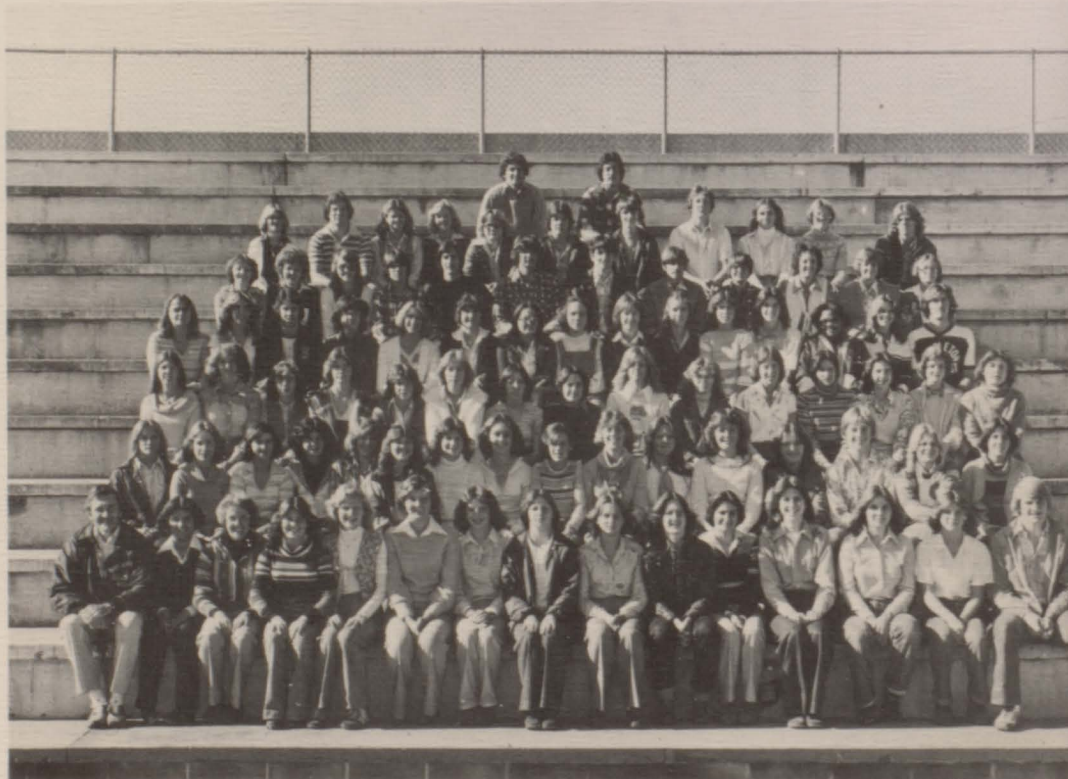

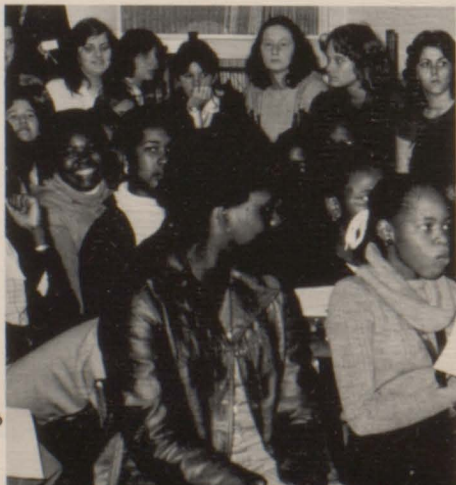

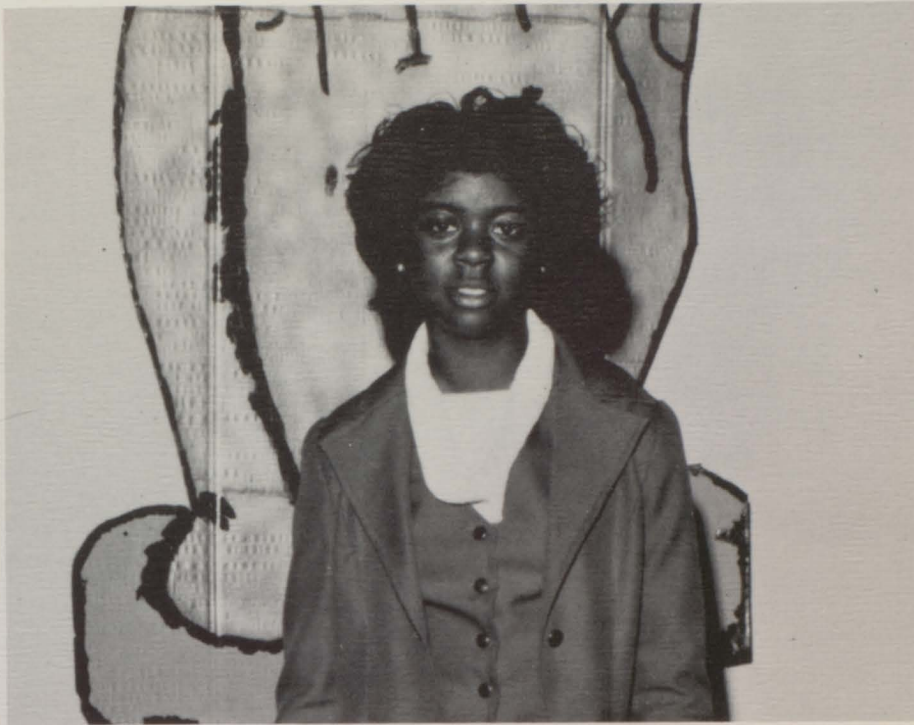
F.H.A. — Working For Their Family

What he envisions

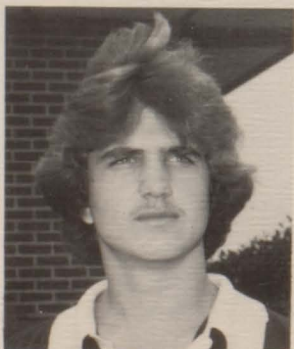

Carter's Bold Mission

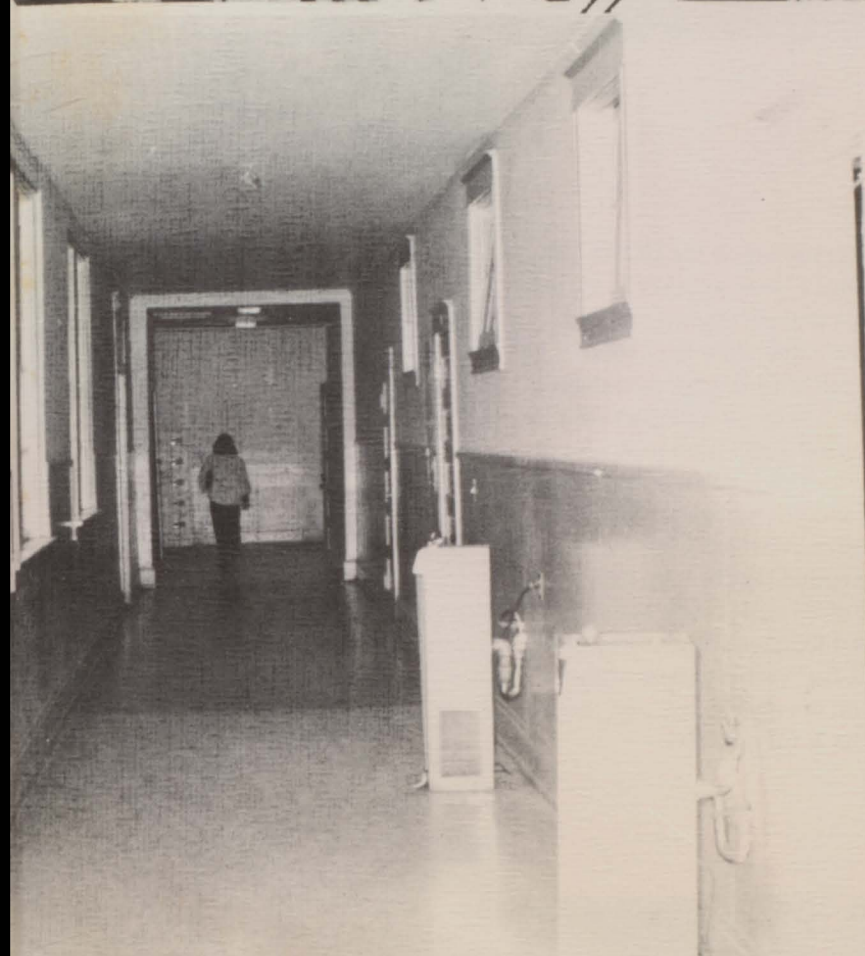
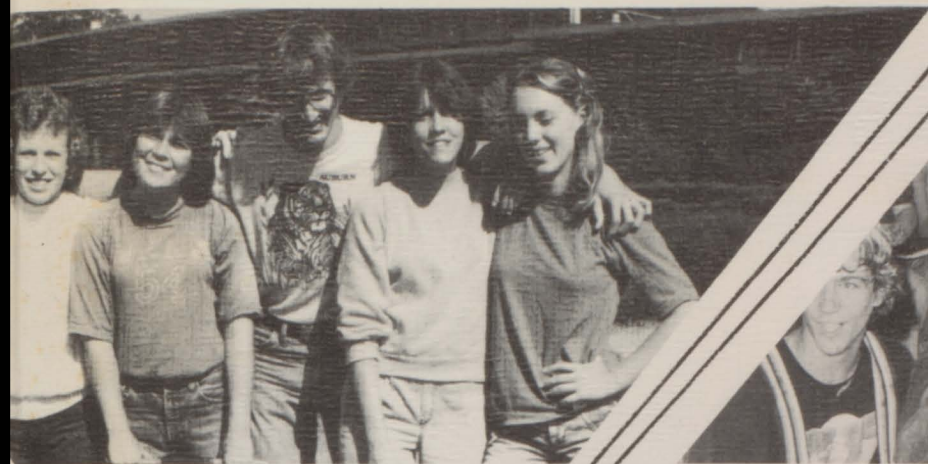


The future is coming — for better or worse. It will keep getting nearer and nearer until we ourselves and our surroundings are part of its picture — and it becomes “Today.”
