The 1980 Balcoala Staff salutes Coach Lyle Bryan Underwood for his 100 th victory as a high school football coach.

Coach (Bull) Underwood was born in Foley, Alabama on August 20, 1932, the second child of J. Harvey and Alice E. Underwood.

In 1951, Underwood was voted "Laziest" by his classmates, but he managed to graduate that same year!
From 1951-1955, Coach Underwood served on U.S.S. Virgo during the Korean Conflict.

In 1955, however, Underwood entered East Mississippi Junior College where he served as football captain, and Vice-President of his class his Freshman and Sophomore years. During that time he was a member of the homecoming, court, and was named "Most Handsome."

Graduating from the University of North Alabama in 1960 with a B.S. degree, Underwood married the former Eleanor Smart on August 11, 1961.

Coach Underwood coached at Fairhope High School from 1960-1964; East Mississippi Junior College from 1964-1966, and came to Baldwin County High School in 1966 where he has continued an outstanding coaching career. His record is presently 102-38-4.

# Baldwin County And Region II Champions 

The 1979 Baldwin Tigers got everybody's attention their first game of the year against Davidson of Mobile. In the first overtime game ever to be played at Simmons Field, Tigers defeated Davidson 18-12 and the fans in the stands were exuberant!

The second game brought defeat the only loss of the season . . . and when the clock clicked off its final second, the score stood Murphy 35 BCHS 22. The Tigers never had control, but they determined then and there, to get control for the remainder of the season, and they did, with faithfulfans to cheer them on! On September 12, Hurricane Frederic hit the Gulf Coast and devastated the entire area and the Bengal schedule along with it. Having rearranged the schedule, the Tigers played McGill-Toolen, and like "Freddy," the Tigers left destruction in their path . . . with a score of 40-12.

The Tigers played B. C. Rains in their first regional game winning 55-7;
this overwhelming victory earning the Tigers G-100's "Team of the Week."

Continuing in victory, the BCHS team defeated Williamson 14-12 . . team to whom the Tigers have never lost.

Toulminville was next on the schedule, and the Tigers crushed them with 2 convincing score of 35-12.

Victory was not always easy, and the Fairhope game proved to be a tough one. It was the first "away from home" contest, and after a see-saw battle for control, the Tigers marched off the field with a 24-21 win!

The Montgomery Advertiser Journal ranked the 1979 Tigers tenth in the state, and visions of a state championship began to formulate in the minds and hearts of players and fans. Foley was the major rival in the way of the Region II Crown and the state playoff berth, but unlike last year, the Tigers defeated Foley 10-6. A home crowd of 10,000 fans watched, play-by-play. This victory brought the second G-100
"Team of the Week" award, along with a seventh place ranking in the state.

A must win against Satsuma followed . . . a "must" win for each player because a victory would mean Coach Lyle Underwood's 100 th victory. Coach Underwood was not disappointed; the Tigers clobbered Satsuma 19-0.

Homecoming was accompanied by rain, but the Devils suffered defeat-a shut-out-and the Tigers claimed a $21-0$ win!

The first round of the state playoffs was the most exciting game of the season. The Tigers made an incredible comeback from a 14-3 half time score to defeat Northview Cougars 29-14.

Stormy weather traveled with the team to Enterprise, Alabama, cancelling the game until the next night. Hopes of a state championship were then crushed as the Tigers suffered a loss, 28-17. What a season . . congratulations, Tigers!

After completion of high school at Valley High in Fairfax, Alabama in 1940, BCHS Principal Wallace R. Williams entered Livingston College. Just two years later, he entered the Navy in tandem with World War II. The Navy saw fit to expand his knowledge at Mississippi College for one semester and then to "ship" him to the midshipmans' school at Colombia University. Then, for six months, William trained as a machinist/gunner at the University of Oklahoma. His military service ended after being in combat until 1946.

In June of the same year, our present administrator returned to Livingston on a football scholarship and earned his Bachelors degree. He then began his career as an educator with a position as a trade and industrial coordinator for soldiers at Livingston. Williams arrived in our city in August of 1948. In Bay Minette, he coached basketball, football, and baseball.

In 1950, the educator attained his first duties as an assistant principal at the grammar school. In 1953, Williams returned to school at Peabody College where he was awarded. a Masters degree. Finally, in 1966, he was named to the position of head principal of BCHS. Since then, Williams says "I have faced one tornado, two major fires, one hurricane, and integration." Also he states; "Our students have met all challenges in an admirable way."
