


### From here to there

After the parade, Chaney Hinote and Scotty Lewis wait with excitement for the ping-pong ball drop.






More than just ...


We may not have loved every class, but we certainly didn't hate all of them either. We used classtime to make friends or we caught a few ".... ZZZ's" that we had missed the night before.
































# Computer lab megabytes of hard work and fun






#### Today— Tomorrow's history

















Although the Lady Tigers weren't at the top of the ranks, they pulled through and made the best of the season














Volume 65 of the **Balcoala** was published by the annual staff and was printed by Herff Jones Yearbooks, Montgomery, Alabama. The 615 copies of this 224 page book were printed in 100 pound Bordeaux paper. The cover was a four-color process picture. The endsheets were done in gray ink.

The body type was Avant Garde 12 point for the opening, divisions, and closing and 10 point for all other copy and 8 point for all captions. Headlines were 42 point for regular headings and 18 point for subheading. Page indentifications were 8 point Avant Garde and all rule lines were 2 point.

Most candid photos were taken by the staff. Senior and school day portraits were taken and processed by Jim Owen Photographics in Mobile.
