
to make the best of the situation, and Mrs. Parnell became known as the "BCHS Bag Lady."








Students were most likely to be found in the heat of the action. The school year brought many different activities of the ordinary and the not so ordinary.
















### Learning makes life














# Exploring the Sensations




#### Phone-antics


#### Written Visions














### Electronics-




#### coming on strong
