




PLAYING IN THE RAIN: Kendel Buck finds a dry spot under her umbrella at one of the football games.





the perfect ending to the perfect week.










He was also an active participant in Fellowship of Christian Students; where during his junior year he was elected vice-president.









Another course, record keeping, was designed to teach students the very basics of keeping ledgers. It taught students to balance checkbooks, and it helped the students become better prepared for accounting.



Physical education helped the students to keep in shape, while also providing them with a break from the books. In P.E. they got to choose from a varity of sports to be active in that six weeks.


In driver's education, students first drove in the simulators and then finally they dared driving on the actual highway. For some of the students this was there first time driving, but after a while they finally got the hang of it.














































GRADUATION DELIGHT: Roses from her mother is enough for Kim Pendarvis to know that she has made It. The diploma was the evidence of a job well done.
